Holly Manager Asks for Criticism of Fox

has attempted to disguise the Fox influence by organizing as the "Medford Amusement company." They admit themselves they have something to hide, to cover up.

The Holly management felt, a year ago, that the public was entitled to know what was going on behind the scenes in the Medford theater situation. Is there any reason why the public TODAY should not be given the same consideration?

The Holly management a year ago asked the CONDEMNATION of Fox interests, yet NOW asks that the same public support the same Fox interests.

As if that were not enough explanation of The Miner's decision to draw aside the curtains and let the general public in on what is really behind the Holly theater opening—with the aid of Mr. Fink-lestein, Mr. Rosenberg and Mr. Newman, (Fox Evergreen to you)—the former Holly theater management about six months ago suggested that The Miner drop county politics and take up this expose of Fox theaters' business practices because, the Holly theater management explained, much of Medford and southern Oregon's future welfare depended on keeping the monopoly of a ruthless chain of theaters from gaining a death grip there. The Miner is glad to comply with the Holly theater's request.

Where the rub comes in for the Holly theater today, however, is in the fact that somehow it has jumped over onto the other side of the fence and has made its bed with FOX.

If you think The Miner has merely been attempting to commercialize its editorial policy because it now is telling the world who really is behind the Holly theater reopening when it refused to utter a word six months ago, the Holly theater management itself has offered the proof that this is not so.

Last spring, when asked to champion the cause of the home-owned theater, we were wary. Not because we had for a moment any doubt as to whether there was an issue at stake, but because we feared the Holly theater management might do the very thing IT DID DO—turn traitor to its own issue and join the enemy camp.

Where would THAT have left The Miner, or any other newspaper that might have listened to the Holly theater's plea for a champion? There are times when all The Miner's luck has not been bad.

As for those Sixth street merchants who, quite naturally, resent opposition to the rebuilding of their section, we have this to say: Had the Holly theater reopened under HOME OPERATION and through HOME INTERESTS, The Miner would have been glad to offer what cooperation it could. We have no feeling against the Holly theater's former management. But we DO

think it deserves more than passing comment when that same management reverses itself and furnishes the tool with which its "unscrupulous Fox monopoly" can again muscle its way into Medford.

We have no interest in encouraging business in one part of Medford as against the other, and possibly Fox interests are all right, but the Holly management ITSELF first told the world what a dangerous, heartless beast this Fox is.

It seems to us to be a case of a man firing a gun and then running around in front of the bullet.

Fluhrer to Feature Grand Opening New Bakery October 14th

The Cascade Wonderland's finest bakery, Fluhrer's, will be ready to greet southern Oregonians and northern Californians next Saturday, October 14, in its new, finer quarters where complete, up-to-date equipment has been installed and is being pressed into service rapidly as possible.

The famous bakery, which sends a network of trucks for miles in every direction, has outgrown its former quarters in the Main street location familiar to thousands and has erected a special building on north Holly avenue, near the post-office, just completed.

By working day and night, ovens, wrapping, mixing and other equipment were moved more than five blocks and all delivery schedules maintained without interruption over the week-end. The bakery is anticipating a gala opening a week from Saturday, October 14, when the general public will be formally introduced to the finer points of modern bread and cake making.

Next Friday's Miner will carry more complete details concerning the grand opening, with detailed information concerning the plant, its operators and the interesting history of one of this section's best-known industries.

Brush Marines Will Have Electric Lights

As a fitting climax to six months of manual labor in the wilds of the Applegate country, the 16 Brush Marines who did not enlist for the winter encampment at Camp Applegate were honored with a farewell dinner at the camp Wednesday night. Fifteen of the boys will return to their homes at Portland, and the remaining Marine, Darrel Sletoff, will return to Ashland to resume his school work.

Camp Applegate is going modern this winter, and will have electric lights as a welcome relief from gasoline, candles, kerosene, or what not in use during the summer. A separate building is being erected to house a gasoline power plant, pump, and electric generator. Other winter construction is

well under way, with the four barracks to be under roof by the end of the week. By that time construction will have started on the administration building, 20 by 105 feet, to include recreation room, company store, supply room, and infirmary. All floors will be covered with asphalt floor covering, said to be hobnail proof.

LEE TRACY COMING TO ROXY THEATER SUNDAY, MONDAY
