JOE McMANN PAYS SHORT VISIT TO JACKSONVILLE

Joe McMann, formerly of this city, spent a short time here Saturday while in southern Oregon visiting with old friends and acquaintances. McMann came from Portland, his present home, in the interests of Joe E. Dunne, candidate for the republican nomination for governor of Oregon.

McMann, who pioneered motorcycle officering in this section several years ago, believes Candidate Dunne to be the only republican in the field who has strength enough at the polls to defeat State Treasurer Rufus Holman, whose friendship for L. A. Banks, former Medford Daily News publisher, among other things, has made him unpopular in this section. It has been feared that, should Holman gain the nomination, and later the governorship, executive clemency would be extended the convicted murderer, Banks.

GEORGE W. DUNN CANDIDATE FOR STATE SENATE POSITION

George W. Dunn is a candidate for nomination for state senator on the republican ticket to succeed himself.

If nominated and elected he will, as he has done in the past 12 years, try to truly represent the people of Oregon. As a member of the ways and means committee at the 1933 regular session of the legislature, he assisted in reducing the state expenses from \$15,000,000 to \$9,000,000 for the biennium 1933 and 1934. As chairman of

the sub-committee of the ways and means committee on agriculture, he saved the state over \$100,000 that in all probability would have been appropriated for the state fair at Salem and the Pacific International at Portland had he not refused, over strong protest and vigorous lobbying, to approve these appropriations. Both of those fairs were successfully held last year without the assistance sought which shows that in those places fairs can and should be self-sustaining.

He is not neutral on the sales tax. He voted for the tax and because of the inability of so many property owners to pay their taxes, an emergency now exists, and he strenuously urges all to vote for the sales tax to meet the emergency, to save our schools, and to relieve property taxpayers of a part of their burden.

He belongs to no faction, has no fads, and desires no further political advancement. He believes in good government, but has no sympathy for the so-called "Good Government congress."

If you think his experience in the legislature and the friendly contacts he has made in all parts of the state would be worth anything to you in promoting good legislation, you can have his services for less than the cost to him.
