In particular are a Wells-Fargo envelope cancelled in Jacksonville, Oregon, in the Beekman bank in 1864, and a letter in full handwriting of the then governor, George L. Curry, dated Salem, November 18, 1856. The governor's letter is the only one on governor's mansion stationery known to exist. Of special interest is an envelope cancelled by Beekman's express, Jacksonville, O. T., dated 1859 and carried entirely through Beekman's service to point of destination, Yreka, with a collect rate of 50 cents, plus a 10-cent government stamp that had purposely not been cancelled. The earliest known Oregon Territory cancellation in manuscript is on an envelope addressed to Warsaw, Indiana, and dated July 6, 1852.

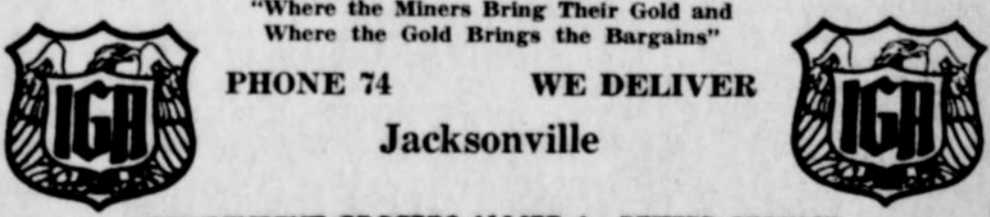
