

GILMORE LIONS TO GROWL AT OLD RIVAL SUNDAY

Medford "Git Downers" to Meet Miners Here 2:30 Sunday When Tie Stand of Nines Will Be Settled

Coming here to settle an old dispute—concerning which nine has the best team, and the best alibis—Medford's Gilmore Lions will invade the Jacksonville diamond to meet the local Miners for the third time this season. Each nine, in two previous encounters together, has won a game.

Gilmore, boasting a snappy nine made up of late "teeners, has been talking of a "winner-take-all" arrangement, and appears quite confident of good luck and plenty of runs when the dust clears away Sunday, said Manager Bob Lewis yesterday. The game, which promises to be another close contest for local fans, will start at 2:30 sharp.

The Miners, however, have been welcoming back their regular first baseman, Weldon McBee, who has been away at national guard camp, and plan to flash their best infield lineup of the entire season over the week-end. "Peewee" Van Galder, high school lad who held down second for half a game last Sunday to show real class, will be started on that position, while the now famous "Screwball" Turner will romp over shortstop's area. Fred Green will hold his regular position at third, leaving Coffman, Greening, Yakel, Coker, Hall and Roger Card to divide time in outfield.

Bill "Screwball" Turner, uncle of Van Galder, played with Denver in the fast Western league for two seasons, and is a close relative of Dazy Vance, world-famous pitcher. The two have been practicing this week with second base dividing their territory, and workouts show blood runs thicker than water, when speaking of the great national sport. Gilmore Felines are expected to start Alva Merritt, young speedball flash, on the mound, with Chuck Ward catching. Bill Hammersley will throw to Si Johnson, for the bucket lifters.

Last Sunday, backing up Pitcher Hammersley with loose infield support at crucial moments, Miners dropped a thrilling 6-7 victory to Shorty Miles' Butte Falls timber cruisers. Both nines started scoring in the second frame, when visitors stretched three hits, two walks and two Miner errors into five runs, and Miners came back in their half with a home run by Ben Coffman and another score when Johnson and Coker bunched their hits. Butte Falls, by smart

base running and timely hitting, added two more runs, one in the fourth and another in the seventh. Miners added a tally in the fourth, also, when singles by Johnson, Coker and Hammersley scored the hard-hitting little catcher.

Gold Diggers remained blanked from then on till last half of the ninth, when score stood 7-3. Turner, first up, smacked out a hard-hit drive down third-base line for a home run, followed by Fred Green's single, a hit on an error in center field by Hall, Coffman's single and a hit on an error by Van Galder, scoring Green. Hall crossed home when Greening sacrificed to the infield, and Johnson walked, to again load the sacks, with two away. Wilton White, newly signed outfielder, struck out to end the game, with tying and winning runs waiting to come home for dear old J'ville.

Hammersley allowed but eight scattered hits and secured 12 strikeouts, while Tungate, for Butte Falls, whiffed 14 and surrendered 15 hits. The box score:

We never expect to know how it feels to receive the Pulitzer newspaper award for disinterested and meritorious public service, but we feel an urge to comment on the awarding of this honor on the Medford (Ore.) Mail Tribune for its part in the Jackson county political rumpus last year. To the casual observer from the outside it would appear that recognition should be given to a lowly weekly newspaper. The Jacksonville Miner and its editor for the leading role played in riding Jackson county of crooked politicians. Observers at the ringside may have obtained a different view of the fracas, but our opinion is formed from newspaper accounts.

For months and months the once-a-week editor of the Jacksonville paper, Leonard Hall, assailed the "gang" and never ceased firing until the ring-leader was in the penitentiary serving a life sentence, with six of his followers. It was Hall, and not the editor of the Mail Tribune, who was horsewhipped on the streets of Medford because he persisted in his fight for a clean county; it was Hall who, through the columns of his paper, showed up every crooked trick of the conspirators; and it was Hall who was given the leading role in the Associated Press dispatches and other news service stories which were published all over the northwest.

It is only once in a lifetime that the lowly weekly newspaper publisher takes the center of the stage with the welfare of an entire county depending upon his leadership, and we figure that Mr. Hall should have been awarded the honor. —Dan W. Bagshaw Jr. in Zillah (Wash.) Mirror.
