In the name of the state of Oregon you are hereby summoned and

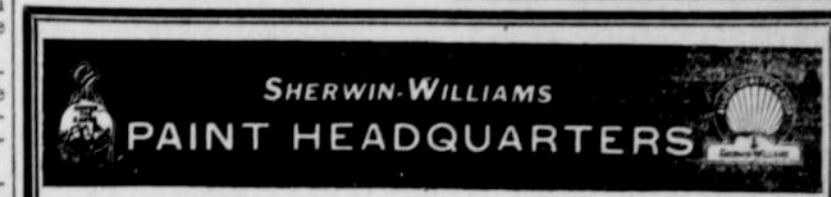
