The teams have worked on this project for the last week and hope to do some good and, also, to explain the tax to the student body.

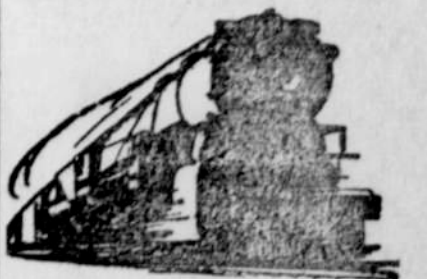
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
