## FEDERAL BANK CHECK TAX OFF JANUARY 1

J. W. Maloney, collector of internal revenue, stated today that the federal tax of two cents on bank checks would not be effective after December 31, 1934.

"The Revenue Act of 1934 provided for the repeal of tax on bank checks, drafts or orders for the payment of money, drawn on a bank, banker, or trust company, at the close of business December 31, 1934," stated Collector Maloney, "but information received at this office indicates that many attorneys and other interested parties have the impression that other taxes imposed by the revenue act of 1932 were repealed on June 30, 1934.

"I would call particular attention to the fact that the increased rates of stamp tax on issues and transfers of capital stock, the stamp tax on deeds of conveyance, the tax on safe deposit box rentals and the tax on all admissions selling for 41 cents or more will be in effect as provided under the present laws, until July 1, 1935. The only taxes which have been repealed are the taxes on candy, soft drinks, and the use of boats."

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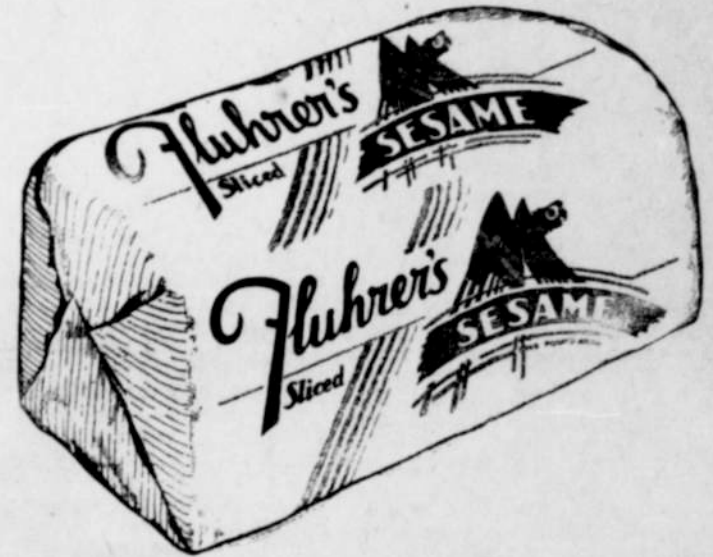
