

Initial Administration Benefit in Northwest

Large accomplishments in forest rehabilitation and improvement were made possible during the past year through the civilian conservation corps, public works, civil works, and transient relief programs, according to the annual report of chief forester F. A. Silcox, recently received by regional forester C. J. Buck, Portland, Ore.

Work done included timber stand improvement, reforestation, insect and disease control, fire hazard reduction and fire protection improvements, control of soil erosion as a means of flood prevention, recreational improvement and creation of more favorable conditions for fish and wild life. The work was carried on on national forests, state forests, private forest lands as authorized by the Clarke-McNary act, and private lands on which erosion control was authorized by the emergency conservation act. The U. S. forest service planned and supervised 80 per cent of all work projects handled under the CCC program.

Indebtedness of Political Divisions of Jackson County

The accompanying table, prepared by a Medford city official, shows the comparative indebtedness of the various subdivisions of Jackson county. The table was compiled for use in the state legislature, which is considering a bill that would enable districts to borrow funds from the federal government at low rates of interest which would be secured by delinquent taxes. At present it is necessary for the subdivisions to issue bonds demanding a high rate of interest to replace funds delayed through delinquencies. Perusal of the table reprinted below will give the reader an accurate comparison of assessed valuations, delinquent taxes, warrant and bonded indebtedness of the various political subdivisions of the county. The figures are as of July, 1934.
