

NORTON TO KEEP EYE ON TALKERS

Suspended sentences, continued from previous terms of the circuit court, were ordered continued Monday by Circuit Judge H. D. Norton as the February term of the circuit court opened in the Medford courthouse.

The order provided continuance of the suspended sentences "until further disposition is made," and affected Mrs. Henrietta H. Martin, president of the "Good Government" congress, found guilty by a Jackson county jury of assault with a "horsewhip" upon Leonard Hall, editor of the Miner, in March, 1933, during political turmoil of that time. Mrs. Martin was convicted in October of that year, and has been under suspended sentence since. Hall, however, refused to bring charges against Mrs. Martin, the state entering its own complaint.

Mrs. Electa A. Fehl, Mae Murray and E. L. Fitch, who last August entered pleas of guilty to criminal libel for the distribution in May, 1934, of the "Black Political Plot Exposed" pamphlet, assertedly written by E. H. Fehl from his state prison cell, attacking Jackson county courts and juries, and the district attorney.

Other sentences continued were: Clarence Edmunds and J. L. Johnson, grand larceny; J. W. Matney, checks; Mrs. Joyce Helms, larceny; William Young, receiving stolen property; Pluma Finney, state liquor violation; James E. Stockman, criminal syndicalism; Price Hale and LeRoy Wright, liquor law violation; Fred O. Gamble, setting trap gun, and Arthur W. Hazelrigg, forgery.

25 BELOW WEATHER IS MONTANA WELCOME OF MILTON BIEGEL AT DAM

A letter recently received from Milton Biegel, who now is working for the government on the big dam project at Fort Peck, Montana, brought word that it was much warmer that day—only 25 degrees below zero. Milton is head machinist, having 12 big dredges to look after, besides smaller equipment. He has three crews maintaining 24-hour service and his own hours are irregular.

The dam is said to be the biggest dirt fill dam in the world and will cost \$4 million dollars, or 21 million more than the Grand Coulee dam on the Columbia. It will form a lake 175 miles long and 16 miles wide at the widest place and will have a shore line of over 2500 miles. It will take five to seven years to build.
