

NEW TYPE GOLD MILL MADE HERE

The use of centrifugal force in separating milk and cream and in drying clothes is well known, but the application to taking gold out of crushed ore is something new, at least in this section. However, it may become common and Ashland become the seat of an extensive manufacture of such machinery if the plans of W. H. Rowe and H. W. Halley work out. Mr. Rowe patented the machine in 1928, while mining in Alaska, and made and sold a goodly number of them up there and is now planning to manufacture and sell them in the states.

Mr. Rowe is in Ashland supervising the manufacture of the machine at the Ashland Iron works. He declares that it will revolutionize the mining business in the treatment of ores. The process is simple. Quicksilver is placed in the bottom of the bowl which revolves so rapidly that the quicksilver is forced into the grooves in the side of the bowl. The gold, being heavier than the ore also is driven to the side of the bowl and imbeds itself in the quick silver.

The process is very rapid and therefore inexpensive, Mr. Rowe states. It will handle 10 tons of fine material per hour. It will also save the finest gold, even particles so fine that it takes 1,000 to be worth a cent. The gentlemen also are manufacturing a hammer stamp and a ball grinder to prepare the ore for the amalgamator.

'CRIME CONFAB IS AID'—TALENT

The crime conference at Portland was very interesting and instructive, Chief of Police C. P. Talent informs the Miner. One of the high spots was the address of Governor Martin, who told the assembled officers that he did not propose to spend a lot of time listening to pleas for paroles and pardons. That he believed the judge who sentenced and the officers and district attorney who secured the conviction were better fitted to pass on such questions, and that he would not grant paroles unless requested by them.

Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general, spoke of the duties of peace officers and district attorneys. He said that it is not the duty of the district attorney to convict an innocent man, but to see that justice is done.

He urged that police officers be trained to know what is evidence and how to prepare it for presentation to the court.

A federal officer present urged that all judges be appointed by the governor. Mr. Moody took exceptions to this, saying that it would build up too much of a machine. The federal official recommended the formation of a department of justice for the state patterned after the department of justice of the United States.

Luke S. May, Seattle criminologist, urged the extension of the finger print system to include all persons. This as a means of protecting the innocent as well as of apprehending and punishing the guilty.

About 700 officers attended the conference, about 150 being from the state of Washington.
