

O'HARRA BUYS STEARNS STORE

A business change of the week has been the sale of the Stearns Self Service store, 61 North Main street, to T. L. O'Harra of Vancouver, Wash.

The Meadowbrook orchards, a choice place in the Rogue River valley, adjoining the town of Rogue River, figured as a consideration of the transfer. Mr. Stearns expects to take a trip through the middlewestern states and to his old home in Iowa, after which he will take over the management and operation of the Meadowbrook orchard property.

The Stearns Self Service store has been owned and operated by H. A. Stearns since 1920, with the exception of the years 1925 to 1929.

Stearns has found these years in business in Ashland to be very pleasant, made so by the friendliness and good will of the people of this community, and he has expressed his appreciation of this friendliness and patronage and has asked that this be extended to his successor, Mr. O'Harra.
