answer. Mitchell did not have any. They had not made money by robbing their workmen either. Every man who had worked for them a year or more owned or was paying for his own home. When a new man proved satisfactory after several months' trial, Alford would go to him and say: "You ought to be getting you a home." Often the reply was: "I have no money to make the first payment."

"Look you up a little place that you can afford and then come to me. I will look at it and if I think it a good buy will lend you the money for the first payment and take a second mortgage on long time, letting you pay the other off first," Alford would say.

Alford never had a strike. Their men would gladly hit the ball for them. One man got tuberculosis. Alford sent him to Arizona, supported him there till he died, brought his body back for burial and gave the widow a check for \$1000.
