G. V. Gillette, 64, Laid to Rest Tuesday

George Virgil Gillette, 64, died early Saturday morning, May 25, at the Southern Pacific hospital in San Francisco, where he had been under treatment for about three months. Gillette was a member of an early pioneer family of southern Oregon, and is survived by a son, George Virgil Jr., and two brothers, Hugh H. Gillette, Ashland, and Edward Gillette, Boise, Idaho. Gillette was a member of Ashland BPOE and the Masonic Blue Lodge.

He was born in Ashland, son of Almon Virgil Gillette and Martha Hill Gillette, pioneers of '49 and '52 and both of Revolutionary stock. Through his mother, whose sisters were Mrs. Mary Dunn and Mrs. Ann Haseltine Russell, he is related to two families which have been leaders in the community life of Ashland since its earliest days. His father was one of the early postmasters of the city, and was a leader throughout his long residence here.

Interment was in Ashland cemetery, with services at Dodge funeral chapel at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 28, with the Rev. M. L. Edwards officiating.

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Look for Radio Noise At Home First Says Club

Does your radio howl? If so, why? The radio club committee and the city superintendent have been looking up some of the causes and find that there are more from small equipment than people usually believe. A motor, a heating pad, an iron, or almost any electrical equipment can cause interference, says a local dealer.

Local electricians state that in most cases a filter can be installed at a cost of about 75 cents which will eliminate interference. Certainly it is worth that, even if you have no radio, to be fair with the neighbor who has.

The more interference is eliminated the more people will use their radios, and therefore the more current they will consume. It is therefore to the interest of the city as well as to the radio owners and dealers to put a stop to unnecessary interference.

The committee and the city are welcoming cooperation in this work. A noisy radio is a curse and tends to discourage the use of this invention.

Howling in your radio is only too often caused in your own household and destroys the usefulness of your neighbor's radio as well as your own. If everyone checks his own household there will be no interference problem, said the radio club committee.
