THROUGH IT PASSED ALL IMMIGRANTS WHO ENTER THE UNITED STATES THROUGH THE PORT OF NEW YORK WHICH IS ALMOST THREE-FOURTHS OF ALL THOSE WHO ENTER THE COUNTRY. THE ISLAND HAS BEEN CALLED THE "GATEWAY TO THE NEW WORLD."
