Culinary Jingles by Marcia Camp

"Now what kind of pudding will really be nice—
 A thrifty brown Betty? Or humble old rice?
 A glorified cobbler? They're tired of that too,
 So what is an eat-weary housewife to do?"
 Whatever you choose, it won't be a flop
 If you sprinkle some gummy marshmallows on top!

A FESTIVE AIR
 HOWEVER modest and unpretentious your pudding may be, those fluffy golden marshmallows on the top will give it a



festive appearance, an intriguing new texture, and a delectable flavor. This is equally true of rice pudding

and bread pudding, which will ring the bell with youngsters every time if they are topped with marshmallows; and of custard, which takes its marshmallows at the bottom of the cup; and of baked apples, which may be stuffed as well as topped with them; and of any other sort of pudding you may care to try the trick with.

Although a trick, it is a perfectly wholesome one, for marshmallows are all good food. And the child who does not love them for their sticky, gooey sweetness has yet to be found.

Caramel Pudding

1 slice bread, 1 inch thick	2 eggs
¼ cup sugar	1 teaspoon vanilla
1 quart scalded milk	12 campfire marshmallows, cut in halves
1 tablespoon butter	

Soak bread until it is soft in enough water to cover. Meantime caramelize 2 tablespoons sugar in a heavy skillet. Add milk and butter and cook gently until caramel dissolves. Press water from bread, add bread to cooked mixture, and heat well. Remove from stove; stir in well-beaten eggs, mixed with remaining sugar and vanilla. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake for 45 minutes in a slow oven (325° F.). Then cover top with marshmallow halves and return to oven to brown lightly. Serve hot with cream or coffee-flavored hard sauce.

Try this one on your child, especially if he fancies he does not care for milk puddings.
