\$601,267 ERA Funds For Oregon Woods

A total of \$1,130,788 of the Emergency Relief act funds is to be made available for use on the national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to a telegram just received by Regional Forester C. J. Buck, Portland, Oregon. Of this, \$601,267 is for Oregon, and \$529,521 is for Washington.

Work projects, according to Mr. Buck, will include construction and maintenance of firebreaks, forest fire lookout stations, telephone lines, forest roads and trails, tree planting and nursery work, timber stand improvement, forest fire prevention and control, fire hazard reduction, development of recreational facilities, insect and disease control, forest range improvements, timber, forage, water and wild life surveys, and other forest improvement work.

Men for the work will be selected from employables on the state relief rolls, according to instructions received.

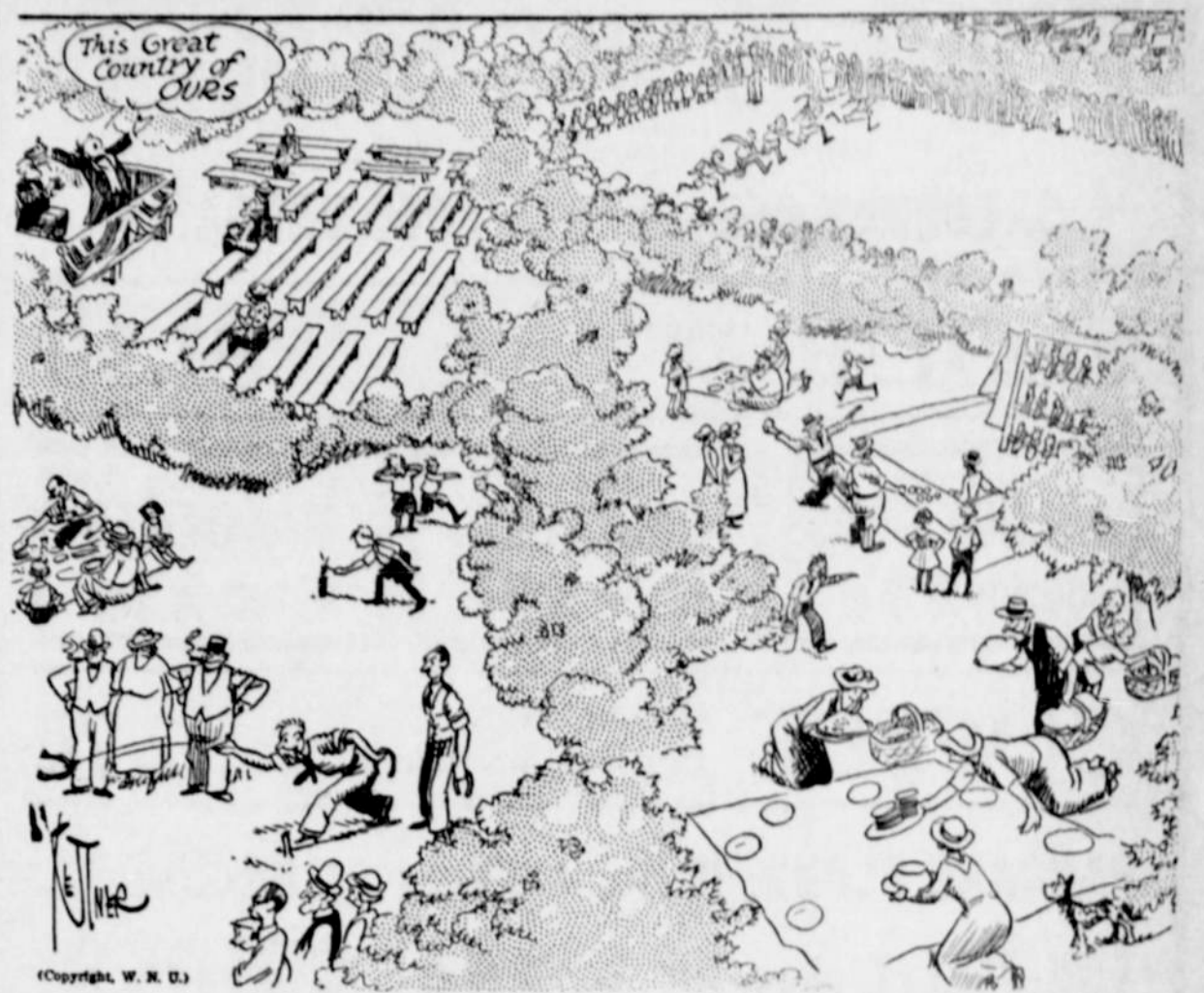
