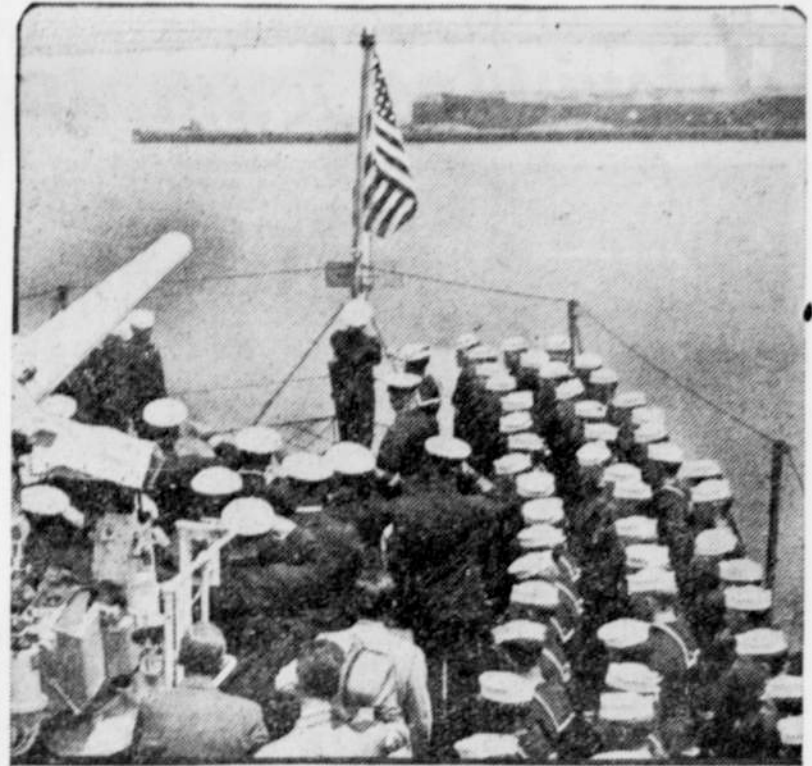


Scenes and Persons in the Current News

New Destroyer Is Commissioned



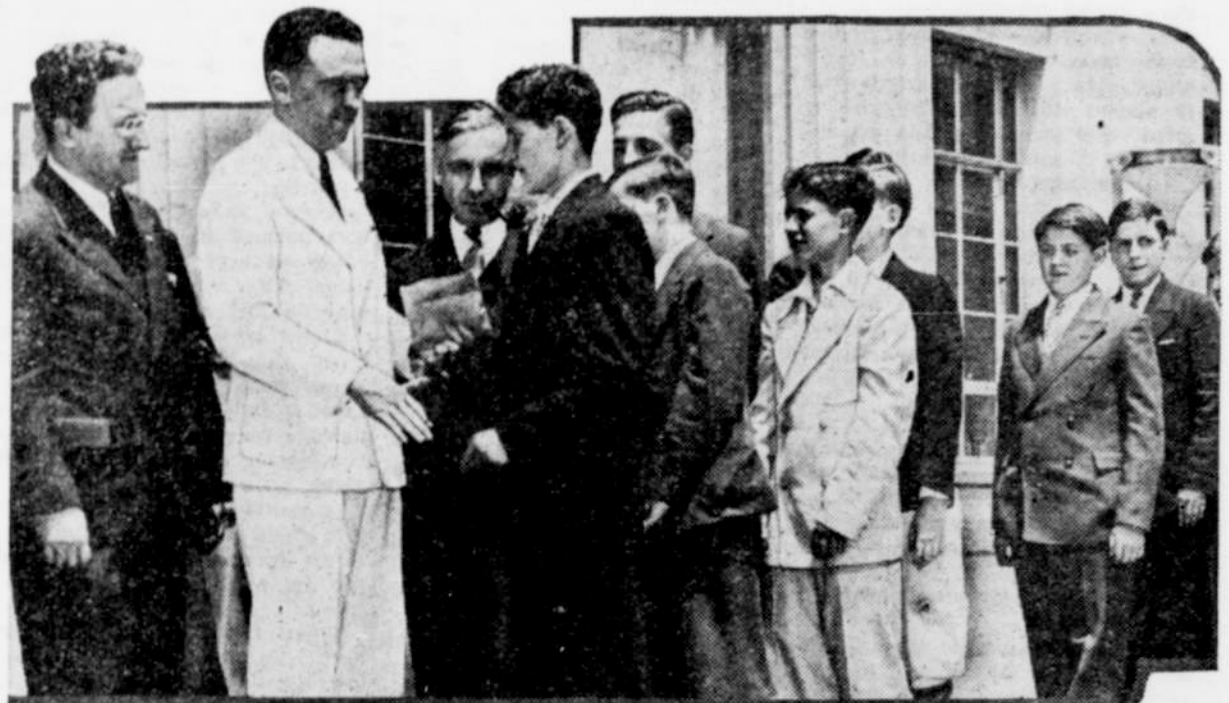

Step Right Up and Tell the Time



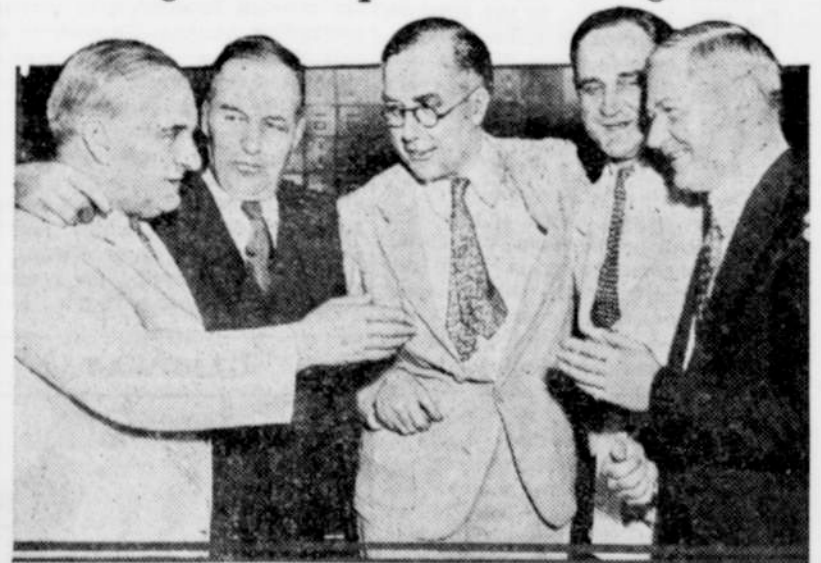
