The reasons why they don't ensnare themselves are as numerous as the unsuccessful anglers. Fishermen are not discouraged, however, as this situation is usual at this time of the year and doesn't last very long.

State Democrats Hold Meeting

Sunday at Blue Lake park near Portland found more than 7000 loyal democrats from all sections of the state attending one of the most successful of all democratic state conventions held for many years.

The program included a bathing beauty contest, boating, fishing, bathing and field events. Representative Lew Wallace conducted the bathing contest. Dr. William A. Harroun was general chairman. Mayor Carson of Portland, master of ceremonies, drew the applause of the crowd when he declared that President Roosevelt, who made Bonneville dam possible, should be trusted with its development "rather than persons who had nothing to do with getting it and who could not possibly have accomplished it."

The "Parade of the Nations," followed by folk dancing and singing, provided surprise after surprise for the huge crowd. Irish, Italian, Swiss, Norwegian, Swedish, Japanese, Chinese, Czechoslovakian and Negro groups participated.

WPA Projects Finally Defined

According to a new bulletin which explains the new setup under the Works Progress administration (WPA), small construction projects, projects of a non-construction type for the utilization of white-collar labor, and projects designed to further recreational facilities are a few of the classifications now stressed in the bulletin.

The main theme of the WPA is to constructively build construction projects where the cost runs over \$25,000 which are directed to be submitted to the WPA.

The bulletin says: "Applications shall be submitted to the Works Progress administration for:

"1. Non-construction projects: Projects of a type designed to assure maximum employment principally to professional, clerical and white collar classes.

"2. Small works projects: Projects of any type where the aggregate cost upon completion is estimated to be \$25,000 or less.

"3. Other works projects: All other projects, regardless of cost, except those referred to in part II (PWA).

Hawley Undecided On 1936 Campaign

Whether or not W. C. Hawley, ex-congressman, will be in the race at the primaries for a return to Washington from this district was still a question Monday night as he entrained from Salem for Denver, Colo.

"It's too hot to decide," was Hawley's comment when pressed for a statement on whether he will seek his former congressional post next spring.

Hawley goes to Denver to attend the quarterly meeting of the board of head managers of the Woodmen of the World, of which board he has been a member since 1896. From Denver he goes to Pittsburgh to attend the national fraternal congress, being a member of its committee on municipal securities.

At Pittsburgh his daughter Iras will take him to her home near Providence, R. I. He will also visit with his son Kenneth at Baltimore later. He goes then to the extreme southern part of Texas in connection with investments made by the Woodmen. He anticipates being absent from Salem some five weeks.

Newton Wins All Coast Trap Shoot Championship Cup

Sid Newton, Medford trap shooter, won the rating of "champion of champions" title in a shoot-off of all Pacific coast handicap champions at the Pacific International shoot at Portland Monday.

This title comes from knocking down 91 out of 100 birds in the preliminary shoot to tie with Joe Cotant, of Boise. In the final shoot Newton mowed down 25 straight birds to Cotant's 23, winning the shoot by two extra points.

Tax Payments Due Next Friday

Foreclosure sale on all tax delinquent property, up to and including the year 1930, will start Saturday, August 24, according to word from the sheriff's office.

Since the first publication last April of the delinquent tax list of 1162 pieces of property, payments have reduced the number to about 350, according to Sheriff Syd I. Brown.

A much smaller number of property pieces is expected to go to final sale due to the large number of payments which are continually coming in.

Delinquent taxes, under Oregon law, are now payable in half whole payments. With the filing of the decree of foreclosure sale, the one-tenth payments are discarded.
