Competition for August Is Close, Says District Commander

Co. 1622 is commanded by Capt. Rupert T. Gilbert, Inf-Res. Co. 964 is commanded by Captain Guy W. Saunders, Inf-Res.

In making the announcement, Major George R. Owen, district commander, stated that the selections this month were difficult because of a close race between the three leading companies, with several other camps not far behind.

Camp Gasquet will display the district flag on its masthead during the coming month. Wimer was winner of first place last month.

YOUNG TROUT PLANTED AT CRATER LAKE PARK

CRATER LAKE—Adding further assurance for continued good fishing in Crater Lake during the years to come, the planting of 120,000 fingerling silversides and steelhead trout was completed in the lake recently.

The fingerlings were obtained from the Butte Falls hatchery and were planted under the direction of Chief Ranger Crouch by park rangers and CCC members.

As a result of annual plantings carried on for sometime past, angling in Crater Lake during the current season has been the best in the history of the park. Limit catches of eight fish per person have been reported with surprising regularity.

Sign Suggested To Direct Trail To Mill Creek Falls

This district, which embraces southern Oregon and northern California, has many remarkable natural beauty spots which can be seen and enjoyed by everyone.

The highway to Crater Lake is probably one of the best in the country for scenic views, which includes the Natural Bridge, the Cascade Gorge and the Mill Creek Falls. In order to get a view of these, however, it is necessary to leave the main highway and drive or hike a short distance.

In the case of the Mill Creek Falls, one is supposed to be able to get a clear view from his car window, and the Forest Service has cut an opening through the forest for the purpose of giving all an unobstructed view of this beautiful fall of water. One oversized fir tree stands at the edge of the highway in the center of the cleared space.

For anyone who wants to get a better look or take a snapshot, the writer suggests he get behind this so-called Oregon pine tree and do his looking, or take the trail to the lower bench overlooking the Rogue River, where the view is really superb.

Next season of heavy tourist traffic over this grand highway, we will try to inveigle the Forest Service to put a large sign on this tree, showing the way to the trail and maybe we can get volunteers to improve this approach to the Rogue River bench.
