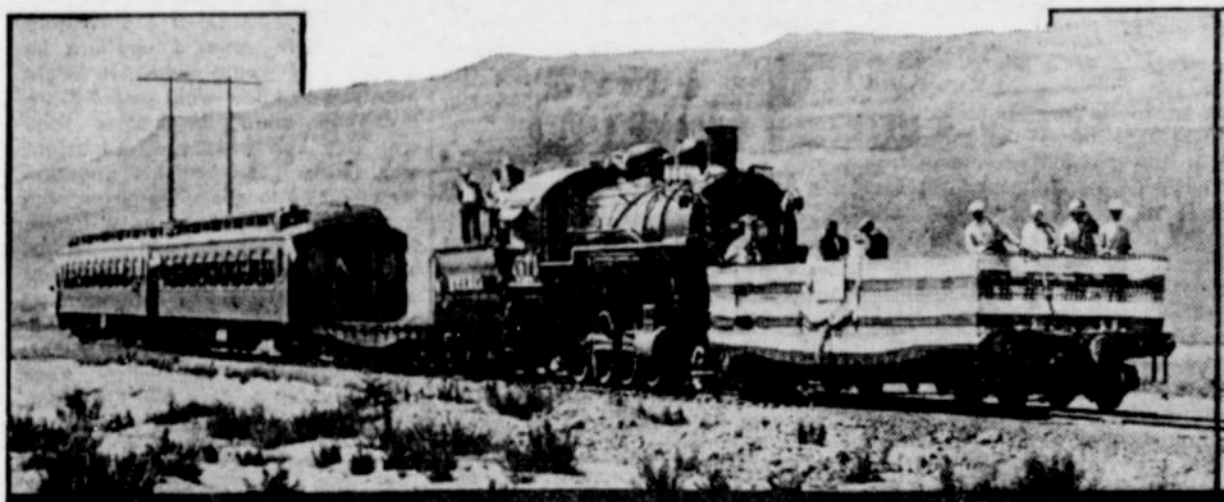

It takes from 500 to 600 pounds of grain to produce 100 pounds of hogs which yield 75 per cent of their live-weight in the form of pork.

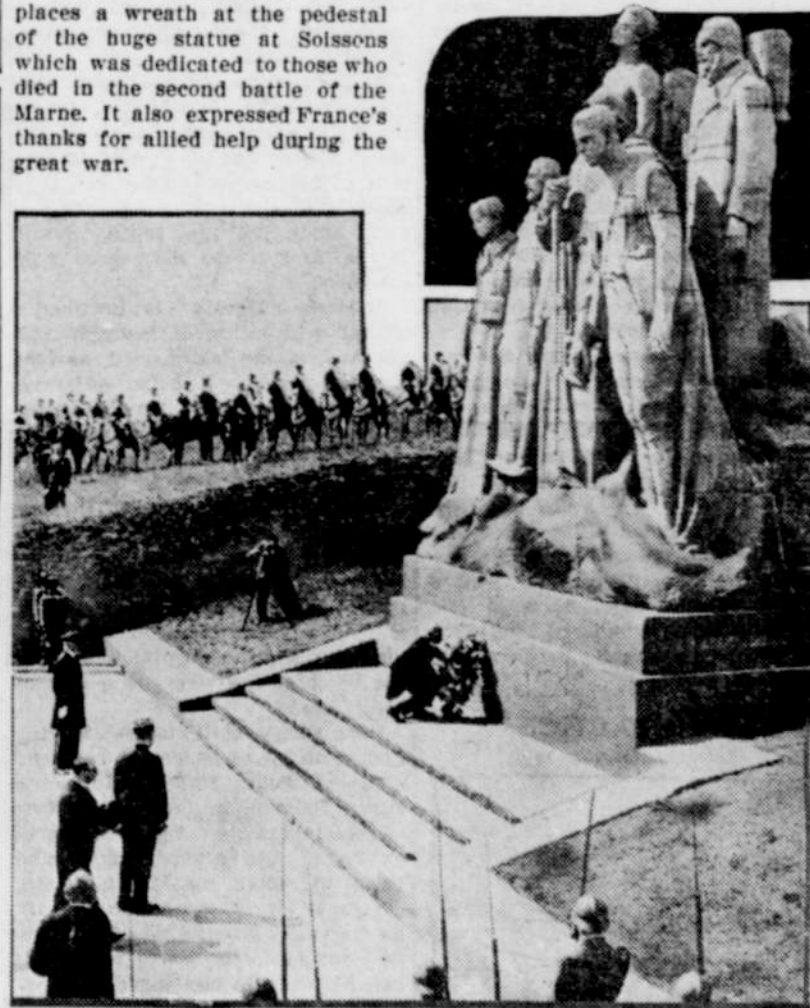
## High Jumper Jumps Into Matrimony
