Snow Crew Saves Pair From Death At Diamond Lake

Thanks to the CCC, Mr. and Mrs. M. B. Griffith, of Los Angeles, are alive to tell of a thrilling experience while snowbound on the Diamond Lake highway.

The couple was saved only by the fact that some of the supplies of the Diamond Lake camp were left behind when the camp was closed and a special trip had to be made in after it.

The Griffiths had started for Crater Lake and turned off on the Diamond Lake road by mistake. Their sedan got stuck in 18 inches of snow and got off the road when they tried to turn it around. Overtaken by darkness, they remained in the car overnight. There was no heater in the machine but holes were cut in the panel under the instrument board to permit circulation of heat from the engine. The fan belt was removed and the engine run all night to provide warmth. Meanwhile, snow continued falling.

Early the next morning the couple set out on foot, not realizing that the nearest house was in Union Creek, 19 miles distant. After trudging through the deep snow for three miles they collapsed, overcome by hunger and exhaustion.

At that moment a snowplow came along. On it were W. L. Jones, construction superintendent of the Forest Service, Fred Middlebush, operator, Grant Neeley, supervising mechanic, and Lieut. Henry A. Harris. They were plowing their way into the Diamond Lake camp to get the remnants of property left when the camp was closed.

The men quickly applied first aid to the tourists, pulled their car from the snow and took them to Mrs. Mary Grieve's inn at Prospect. They reached the resort shortly after noon Friday, and ate their first meal since Thursday morning. They were hysterical with joy when the CCC party arrived and for some time could

COOS HEAD — A public address system, installed recently, brings every man in camp in constant touch with the main office for the receipt of announcements and news items.

The system was installed under the direction of Dr. John J. Haruff, camp surgeon, and its uses were soon apparent. No more running from barrack to barrack in search of men wanted in the office; no more wondering if it is time for classes; no more waste of time in assembling a group, just a flip of the switch and speaker may address the entire company!

Every night, Monday through Friday, the "March of Time" is broadcast, followed by Coos Head's own news review, prepared by the staff of The Chatterbox, camp newspaper, and presented by the camp's own actors.

Each of the four barracks, as well as the mess hall, recreation hall, schoolhouse and garage is equipped with speakers. Even "the man in the (company) street" is not neglected—a large dynamic speaker on the Headquarters front porch covers the camp from recreation hall to infirmary.

THE BATCHELOR KING OF ENGLAND, AND BATCHELOR PRESIDENT OF THE U.S.



JAMES BUCHANAN (1791-1868) WAS THE FIFTEENTH PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES, AND WAS BORN IN PENNSYLVANIA, BEING THE ONLY MAN FROM PENNSYLVANIA TO HOLD THIS OFFICE. HE WAS THE NATION'S ONLY BATCHELOR PRESIDENT. GROVER CLEVELAND, AS TWENTY-SECOND PRESIDENT, ASSUMED OFFICE AS A BATCHELOR, BUT MARRIED MISS FRANCIS FOLSOM, IN THE WHITE HOUSE, THE FOLLOWING YEAR (1886). BUCHANAN WAS SUPPOSE TO HAVE LEFT AN ESTATE WHICH HAS BEEN VALUED UP TO \$250,000,000. MANY HEIRS APPEARED FOR IT, BUT IT PROVED A HOAX.



POOR RUFUS, HE MISSED SO MUCH! WILLIAM RUFUS OR WILLIAM II (1056-1100) KING OF ENGLAND, WAS CALLED RUFUS BECAUSE OF HIS RED HAIR. HE WAS THE SON OF WILLIAM I (THE CONQUEROR). HE WAS CROWNED KING SEPT. 26, 1087. HE CAME IMMEDIATELY TO ENGLAND, SEIZED THE TREASURY AND WAS CROWNED AT WESTMINSTER. THE COURT OF ENGLAND'S WILLIAM RUFUS MET HIS DEATH IN THE NEW FOREST IN 1100 BY AN ARROW. DISCHARGED BY WALTER TIRREL, LORD OF POWY, WHICH IS SAID TO HAVE BEEN TURNED IN ITS FLIGHT BY GLANCING FROM THE BACK OF A HART. HE WAS BURIED IN WINCHESTER CATHEDRAL.
