Southern Oregon Normal school SONS will make their first local basketball appearance of the year tomorrow night at the Junior high gym, tangling with the team that upset University of Oregon three weeks ago—Eugene Town team.

Boasting a pair of former Oregon stars and two former All State high school fishes, the Eugene quintet will undoubtedly furnish plenty of competition for the SONS. Practically the same lineup that nosed out Oregon 41-40 will start against the locals. Bill Berg, former Webfoot captain, will be at a forward berth for the visitors and Bob Miller, another ex-Oregon player, will hold down the center post. At the guards will be Ed Seigmund, former Salem high All State man, and Clayton James, formerly of Bend and prominent in State independent circles. Wilson Seigmund will be at the other forward position.

For the SONS, Neil Winkle and Ted Schopf will take care of the forward berths; lanky Bob Hardy, center; and Mordel Walton and Howard Scroggins the guards. That is the lineup that saw most of the service against Oregon last week. Coach Jean Eberhart, after his team's fine showing in that game, declared himself very well pleased with the performance of Winkle and Walton, especially.

SONS To Play Fresno Bulldogs

Fresno State College Bulldogs, champions of the powerful Far Western Conference last year, will be in Ashland Monday and Tuesday nights of next week to play the Southern Oregon Normal SONS.

Featuring their famed "breaker-downer-builder-upper" attack, which carried them through an undefeated season to rate them one of the finest teams in all of California, Fresno will probably provide Coach Eberhart's SONS their toughest test of the entire year.

The "breaker-downer-builder-upper" system of play, invented by Fresno and used with great success, works in this fashion. The "breaker-downers"—five huge and tough football players, work for the first half of the game and attempt to soften up the opposition for the "builder-uppers." The latter five men enter the game in the second half, and with the opposing team battered and groggy, fake and speed their way to victory.

Coach Stanley Borleske of the Bulldogs lost only two players last year's ten regulars, and this year expects an even better team than last.
