LETTERS to the Editor

Dear Editor:

At a meeting of Townsend Club No. 2 of Ashland a discussion as to what the Townsend movement really is, was held. The following thoughts were contributed.

It is a movement having its beginning nearly two years ago having, or providing for, the pensioning of all American citizens over sixty years old, barring some minor restrictions. Said pension consisting of monies issued in the form of a loan, the monies to be secured by a federal retail sales tax, of no definite amount but in quantity sufficient to secure the amount required to pay the pension of \$2400 annually to each pensioner. Briefly this was the movement in the beginning. Realizing from the beginning that without doubt there would necessarily be changes to make the movement proficient and successful, Dr. Townsend, from whom the movement gets its name, and his co-workers, have said that changes would and should be made to make it successful and proficient. Bills in Congress would of necessity be made. The McGroarty bill H. R. 7154 has been drawn and submitted. Instead of a retail federal tax we have the federal transaction tax provided. See interpretation of the McGroarty Bill, page 9, Townsend Booklet No. 2. Consultation of the Townsend plan is greatly helped by consultation of the page referred to above. Other changes may be necessary but it is all provided for by the flexibility of the plan. The flexibility of the movement is the beauty and strength of the plan. It makes possible its success, tends to make it just and fair.

If it were rigid its very rigidity would make it undesirable. It is true that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. The sponsors of the movement should ever be on guard looking to the preservation of and justice made available by the success thereof. The discussion referred to at the beginning of this article brought out that transaction tax was the primary idea. That nothing should be brought into the movement or any discussion in Townsend clubs that would hinder the success of the movement. All isms and party creeds should be forgotten. Many, very many things good, very good or otherwise should be kept in the offering. The Townsend movement will make these things possible that would make or would otherwise be impossible. To the writer it would appear that any person insisting on carrying on a battle in the offering, thus disturbing the movement, the enemies of the movement. This last sentence might appear to include a lot of folks who innocently are not aware of the harm they are doing. Forgetting all divisions and avoiding all those disturbances, let us march on to victory.
