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THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE

The Townsend Plan, once a subject of sneers, ridicule and railery, has become the paramount issue, the big topic, the spectre that haunts the politicians. The mossback wiseacres say the plan is fantastic, foolish, impossible. That's what the mossbacks said when Noah was building the ark. It's what they said when the first Republic was started; they thought monarchy was the only sensible government. It's what they said about the steam engine, the railroad, the steamboat, the airplane. It's what they have said about every advance move the world has ever made, whether in art, science, government or politics. The Townsend Plan is not a whit more fantastic, foolish or impossible than the Magna Charta looked to old King John or the Declaration of Independence to George the Third and his Tory henchmen. William Allen White of Kansas got started on his road to fame by caustic ridicule of the Populist party, and later boosted the most important principles of Populism. The Townsend movement can't be stopped by ridicule. Neither can it be stopped by the age-old cry of "Impossible!"

RECIPROCITY

The reciprocal trade agreement between this country and Canada is not meeting the violent opposition of the business world which was expected when first announced. In fact, as all angles are studied and better understood, reciprocity is being looked upon as a way out of the murky fogs that have so long caused business to grope. A business magazine of national circulation recently said: "The general effect of the agreement is beneficial. The depression and high tariffs reduced Canada import of our goods from \$948,000,000 in 1929 to \$302,000,000 in 1934, and our imports from Canada fell from \$502,000,000 to \$252,000,000. By reduction in rates, and highly important changes in regulations

the agreement seeks to restore the former trade. These agreements are the most powerful single blow that has been struck in any part of the world against the ruinous tariff walls of recent years."

SENATOR BORAH

Old Guard standpatters of the G. O. P. are finding that Senator Borah of Idaho also knows how to stand pat on his liberal principles. They tempted him with hints of eastern conservative support. His answer was: "They have views on inflation and I have another. What do they mean by inflation? I have never advocated anything except expansion of the currency on a sound gold reserve." Then referring to the Patman bonus bill, Senator Borah said: "I advocated the bonus payment in new currency, when we had \$9,500,000,000 in gold and \$1,500,000,000 in silver and only \$4,500,000,000 of currency in circulation. Had we put two billion dollars out for the bonus we would have had six and a half billion dollars of currency with nine and a half billion dollars of gold. I cannot see any inflation in that." Senator Borah further said that he favored "reflation" rather than "inflation," and described reflation as "enough currency to stimulate business in view of the fact that bank credit has practically disappeared."

THAT SALES TAX

From all indications the proposed sales tax is going to "get the ax" by Oregon voters in the special election of January 31. It's getting so all forms of taxes, steadily piling up, are being resented by the victims, but the sales tax is specially odious to the big majority. Voters are not kidding themselves that taxes can be escaped, but they want the legislators and other officials whom they elect, to understand that there is a limit to patience and tolerance. Costs of conducting state, county and city governments naturally increases as population increases. But lately they have increased at a staggering rate, regardless of ability to pay. There's no use of an orgy of spending. Every ultimate consumer should remember that he is always the one who pays the tax, no matter in what form it is levied.

THE NEW DEAL

Whether you like the New Deal or not, you'll have to admit this: Industry was in mighty bad shape before the New Deal started and it was mighty glad to have the New Deal pull it out of the hole. Now it is out again it apparently is caging to get back into the old unbridled methods of clawing and biting and chiseling.
