Clear Lake Vets Dress Up Camp

CLEAR LAKE — The painters of Company 1919, veteran's outfit, have been busy the past month decorating the interiors of the recreation hall, school building, infirmary and mess hall. The woodwork and studding have been stained a dark green; the paneling between the studding has been calasomined a light apple-green, the two colors giving a pleasing finish.

A pool table has been installed in the recreation hall.

Six observation towers have been erected on the Tule Lake bird refuge, to be used by the biologists to study the life and habits of the migratory fowl that visit the refuge.

Eight miles of the new truck trail giving access to the Clear Lake bird refuge have been completed, leaving a balance of 2 1/2 miles to be finished to the lake. There will also be an additional 15 miles of trail built around the lake, giving access to all points of this project.

Some 30,000 rods of fencing is to be built around the Clear Lake refuge as soon as the material can be obtained.
