Meaning of "Bears" and "Bulls" as Market Terms

A "bear," with reference to "bears" and "bulls" of exchange, is one who contracts to sell securities, foreign exchange, or commodities, especially without ownership of the thing sold, in the expectation of obtaining it at a lowered price before the time of final settlement.

The name was originally "bear-skin jobbers," and was probably first used in allusion to the proverb "To sell the bear's skin before one has caught the bear." A bear is also one who speculates for a decline or one who sells short, observes a writer in the Indianapolis News.

A bull is one who operates on a stock, commodity, or produce exchange in expectation of a rise in the price of securities or commodities, or in order to effect such a rise, and is just the opposite of bear.

A bearish market is one tending to fall in price and a bullish market is one tending to rise in price. The bears and bulls who attempt the one to depress and the other to raise prices, are said to be so called in allusion to the bear's habit of pulling down, and the bull's of tossing up.

BENJ. FRANKLIN (1706-1790) PRINTER, PHILOSOPHER AND AUTHOR AND STATESMAN WAS BORN JAN. 17, 1706 IN BOSTON MASS. HE QUARRELED WITH HIS BROTHER AND LEFT HOME TO SEEK HIS FORTUNE. IN 1723 HE LEFT FOR NEW YORK TO OBTAIN A POSITION WITH WM. BRADDOCK, THE PRINTER, BUT HAVING HONORARY BRADDOCK ADVISED HIM TO SEE HIS SON ANDREW IN PHILADELPHIA. FRANKLIN DID THIS AND ARRIVED IN PHILADELPHIA OCTOBER 1723, BUT AS HE STAYED WITH ANDREW BRADDOCK HE WORKED FOR HIS COMPETITOR, SAMUEL KEIMER.

ON SEPT. 1, 1730 FRANKLIN MARRIED DEBORAH READ THE DAUGHTER OF A CARPENTER WHERE HE FIRST BOARDED. HIS LIFE IS FULL OF "TO ALL AMERICANS AND ESPECIALLY TO PHILADELPHIA" FOR MOST CITIZENS—BY CHANCE.

STEPHEN GIRARD (1791-1853) FARMER, MERCHANT AND PHILANTHROPIST WAS BORN IN GORHAM, ME. AT THE AGE OF 14 HE WAS A CABIN BOY AND IN 1773, WHEN BUT 23 YEARS OLD, WAS A CAPTAIN. WITH HIS FLEET OF PHILADELPHIA TO BRITISH VESSELS AND TO STAY UP ON WATER AND ATONE MADE IT HIS HOME. HE PRACTICALLY FINANCED THE WAR OF 1812 AND BECAME A GREAT PHILANTHROPIST AND WAS A GREAT HERO DURING THE YELLOW FEVER EPIDEMICS. HE DIED IN 1851 AND WAS LATER INTERRED IN GIRARD COLLEGE.



BY HIS WILL GIRARD LEFT TO THE CITY OF PHILADELPHIA HIS ESTATE VALUED IN 1831 AT \$6,000,000, THE PRINCIPAL OF WHICH WAS TO SUPPORT GIRARD COLLEGE, A SCHOOL FOR FORTUNLESS BOYS.
