Fire Problem Is Being Considered

Future productiveness for 380 square miles of choice Oregon timber land laid waste by the great Tillamook fire of 1933 hangs on the slender thread of providing protection for the little trees now springing up over most of the burned area, according to Governor Martin's Tillamook Burn Committee which went into action last week in Portland.

The committee is composed of George J. Gerlinger, and A. R. Watzek, members of the State Board of Forestry, H. L. Plumb and W. B. Osborne of the U. S.

Forest Service and Russell Mills, representing the West Coast Lumbermen's Association.

A recent report from the Pacific Northwest forest experiment station indicates that the devastated area is "staging a remarkable comeback," with one and two year seedlings springing up over some 70% of the burn. However, the experiment station also points out that except for extraordinary protective measures, fires will almost inevitably sweep the desolated area again, this time destroying the last vestige of hope for practical reforestation on a large scale.

The situation has appeared so grave from the standpoint of the state economy that the Governor has appointed a special committee
