Primary Results For This County

Jackson county Democrats gave President Roosevelt a vote of 2576 in the primary election of last Friday, according to the official count. Vice President Garner received 2489 votes.

The primary brought out a light vote in the county, as well as in most parts of the state. Indications however point to a hot campaign in the November election. Following are the nominees for county offices:

On the Democratic ticket, Ralph Sweeney was nominated over Ray Schuemaker for county treasurer, Clarence Pankey was nominated over Henrietta B. Martin for county clerk, Ralph Jennings was nominated without opposition for county treasurer, Lew Hansen of Ashland was nominated for county assessor, and James Stevens and Moore Hamilton were nominated as candidates for the state legislature.

On the Republican ticket, Frank J. Newman was nominated as the Republican candidate for district attorney over Kramer Deuel and Victor Tengwald. William McCallister and Glen O. Taylor were nominated as candidates for the state legislature. Ralph Billings was nominated over William Bruin for county commissioner, and G. R. Carter was nominated for county clerk, J. P. Coleman was nominated for county assessor, A. C. Walker was nominated for county treasurer and Frank Perl for county coroner.

Approximately 400 men and women will receive degrees at the sixty-seventh annual commencement at Oregon State College Monday, June 1, when the traditional rites and ceremonies will be carried out on the campus.

Reports from the eight schools and degree-granting departments are that the employment situation is far better than for a number of years, with more demand both from industrial centers and from educational institutions for outstanding students to take scholarships and advanced work. In addition there are more openings in the high schools and government service. Many students have several good offers to choose from.

As usual the Oregon State alumni will have an important part in the commencement week events, with the 1911 class scheduled for its silver jubilee reunion. This class will open the week-end festivities with its silver jubilee dinner the evening of May 29. On Saturday, May 30, will be other reunion class events, the general alumni luncheon, the annual alumni business meeting, and in the evening the alumni reunion ball.

Commencement this year is on the same day both at the state college and state university campuses, the former being in the forenoon and the latter in the afternoon.
