

OREGON CAVES ANNOUNCE NEW GUIDE SERVICE

Of interest to many local people who will visit the Oregon Caves this summer is the following guide schedule recently issued:

May 15 to June 15
10:00 a.m. and 1:00 and 3:30 p.m.
June 15 to Sept. 10
9:00 and 10: a.m.; 1:00 and 2:00 p. m.
Also 11: a.m. and 3, 4, 5, and 7 p. m.

Out of schedule trips are made with 12 to 16 visitors, at all hours between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Regular guide service, May 15 to October 15, a party under one guide not more than 16 people.

Special guide service can be had by special arrangement.

The route of the trip through the Oregon Caves has been fully explored and traversed by more than 300,000 people. A nursery in charge of an agreeable, competent lady to care for the children is provided.

Bridge Builders Use Local Forest Products

Important in indicating new markets for Oregon and Washington forest products is the bridge just completed by the U. S. Forest Service across Trout Creek, north of the Columbia river near Carson, Washington. The bridge, which was opened to traffic recently, was designed by forest service engineers and built by CCC labor under forest service direction. Constructed entirely of creosoted or wolmanized Douglas fir manufactured and treated in northwest plants, this structure embodies the latest methods of wood use combining great strength and economy.

Among other bridges built by the CCC under forest service supervision is the suspension bridge opened last year over Rogue River near Grants Pass, which is believed to be the longest single span wooden bridge in the world.

Forest Service Publishes Guide

"Forest Trees and Forest Regions of the United States" is the title of a booklet by extension forester W. R. Mattoon, recently published by the U. S. Forest Service.

The booklet lists 810 kinds of native trees in the eastern and western forests of the continental United States, with a notation of the region in which each tree grows, and brief description to aid in its identification.

"Different trees are found in natural association or mixtures in different parts of the United States as a result of varying condition of temperature, rain or snowfall, and soil conditions" the author explains. He lists the forest types composing each of six natural forest regions of the country and discusses the extent of their forests, their timber content, and the forest drain and growth of each.
