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SALEM'S WATER

We notice from a story in the Oregon Statesman, Salem's morning paper, that a drilled well 336.3 feet deep remains intact on the capitol site. Water is found within 18 feet of the top of the casing. This well was drilled many years ago to supply the capitol building but was abandoned in favor of the city water.

From all we hear concerning the water situation in the capitol city it might be advisable for the powers that be to reopen the well, with appropriate ceremonies; for instance the governor might take the first glass of water to be pumped and use it to lubricate his throat during a like-wise appropriate speech.

It seems that the Willamette river is the source of Salem's water supply; some of the city council are in favor of sinking wells; others in favor of piping water from the North Santiam river; and both have adequate engineering proof that each would supply an adequate quantity of water for municipal purposes. But they are still drinking water pumped from the muddy Willamette.

"Governor Lehman of New York has signed a bill to remove the stigma of illegitimacy from children born out of wedlock. The bill provides that "there shall be no specified statement on the birth certificate as to whether the child was born in wedlock or out of wedlock, or as to the marital name or status of the mother. It is a belated effort to treat justly those children who come into the world under what the fictionists have called the "bar sinister". These children will have tough going enough as it is. Common usage should go farther and adopt the term "natural child" instead of illegitimate with reference to such children. English writers use the former term, which has less of stigma inhering in it than the latter. We have gotten away from the old idea that the child should be visited with punishment because of the sins of his parents. Our constitutions forbid passing bills of attainder. Yet we have done little to give a fair break to the natural child." (The Oregon Statesman.)

There is a persistent rumor circulating that the city editor of our contemporary newspaper is married. Just as soon as we can delve to the bottom of this rumor, we'll say something about it.

We noticed in a recent edition of our esteemed contemporary a suggestion that the section of highway between the under-ground crossing north of town and the city limits, that the state should see to a project of beautification for this section of the Pacific highway.

We are in full agreement with the daily as to value of such a move; but doesn't it seem more pertinent to follow the old proverb that "Charity begins at home?" We mean that more care should be given to the beautification of residential and business districts.

Here we might mention two lots right within the main part of the city, one block just south of the location of our "favorite" paper, and the other a block further south. Both are merely excavations into the side of the hill, both are horrible eye-sores. If something is to be done, start here and work both north and south.

Cover Spray For Control Of Moths Used By June 20

Codling moth spray, for control of the larvae, should be completed by June 20th, according to C. B. Cordy, assistant county agent, and L. G. Gentner, entomologist of the Southern Oregon experimental station.

Spray for the control of Codling moth is mixed as follows: 3 pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water.

Large numbers of the moths have been seen flying during the past few nights. Spray must be utilized immediately to gain benefits.

Increase Expected In Summer Class At Oregon State

CO., FALLS, June 18.—A record summer session at OSC is in prospect if advance requests for catalogues and information prove to be an accurate indication of final enrollment. The meeting of the National Education association at Seattle July 6 to 11, are bringing far more inquiries from middlewestern, southern and eastern states than ever before, reports Dean M. Ellwood Smith, director of the session.

Two weeks before the session is scheduled to open June 22, there were upwards of 200 more requests for catalogs and information than had been received at the same time a year ago. A large number of visiting instructors, some made possible by the conventions mentioned, are scheduled for stiff positions.

A feature of the session is the vocational guidance conference June 22 to 26, to be conducted by the school of education. The director of this conference will be Dr. Harry D. Kitson, professor of education at Teachers' College, Columbia university. Others taking part will include Dean J. R. Jewell, director of high school teacher training in the state system of higher education; C. W. Saler, vice-dean of the school of education at OSC; Wesley E. Armstrong, high school supervisor of Salt Lake City; O. D. Adams, state director for vocational education; F. G. Lesure, director of vocational education, Portland; Louis M. Price of Stanford, and F. C. Moore of Cleveland.

WATER SURVEY TO BE MADE IN EASTERN ORE

Data showing the vital needs for wells, dams, reservoirs, and other water projects that will greatly increase the value of the vast areas of range land in Eastern Oregon will be included in the water resources survey now under way in Oregon, it was announced by O. R. Bean, chairman of the Oregon State planning board.

F. H. Brandt, head of the department of animal husbandry of OSC, is now in Eastern Oregon conducting a survey.

Areas to be investigated by Mr. Brandt, are located in Lake, Harney, Malheur, Deschutes, Crook, Morrow and Jefferson counties.

The water resources survey of Oregon will be a part of the national project sponsored by the National resources committee, at the request of President Roosevelt.

At many places range can only be used a part of the year at present, and necessitates expensive movement of stock. Under much grazing land often suffers, not only from the crowding of stock by tramping. If the land could be used the year around, it would not only better conditions for stock raising, but would make administration of the Taylor grazing act more efficient, according to Brandt. Cooperation of the grazing administration will be enlisted for the work.

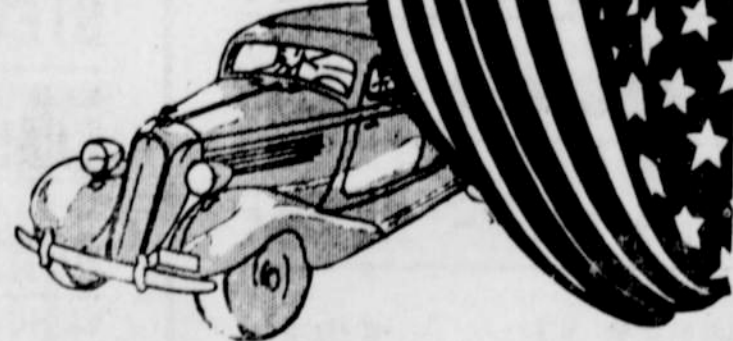
