

On Oregon Farms

SALEM - Oregon dairy plants now manufacture per year 30 million pounds of butter, 16 million pounds of cheese, 26 million pounds of condensed milk, 5 million pounds skim milk powder, 1½ million gallons of ice cream and about 1½ million pounds of cottage cheese.

As late as the beginning of the present century, Oregon imported considerable quantities of butter and cheese. In 1933, 8 million pounds of butter and 9 million pounds of cheese were shipped from Oregon to California.

April 1933 was the low point in farm wage scales during the depression years, according to statistical data gathered on farm labor by the federal emergency relief administration.

The survey covered information on geographical distribution of farm labor employed in Oregon and gross amounts as well as daily wages paid in various counties of the state. The study is intended to serve as a background for more comprehensive inquiry into the principal farm labor problems. Since April 1933 when the wage rates with board averaged \$18.75 a month, there has been a steady increase with the seasonal fluctuation to an average of more than \$30.00 with board and \$47.00 without board.

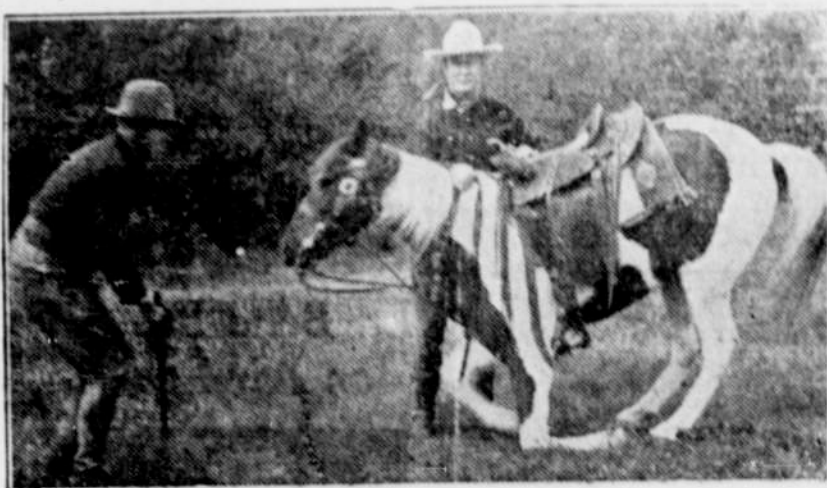

Townsend Topics

Youth demands Work, Life, Liberty and Happiness. Dr. Studebaker, U. S. Commissioner of Education, reported last year to President Roosevelt that 3,500,000 young men between the ages of 16 and 25, graduated from high schools and colleges, have never had a job and are in dire distress. And what of the young women? There position is even more pathetic. These young people have been made social outcasts. The "Liberty League" and the self serving politicians prate about the constitution and condemn these young people for communistic activities while they do nothing to give them the right to work, establish homes, and become fathers and mothers and tax paying citizens.

These young people have a right to demand, in the words of the Declaration of Independence, Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness. And under the Constitution, they have the right to demand that provisions be made for their general welfare.

Why condemn these young people for communistic activities, when the government fails or refuses to follow the Declaration of Independence and the mandates of the Constitution? For does not the Declaration of Independence say: "Whenever any form of government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the right of the people to alter or abolish and to institute new government — on such principles —"

in such form as to them shall seem more likely to effect their safety and happiness.

Youth will not tolerate a continuation of present conditions. They are reluctant to turn to communism and violence. That is why increasing numbers of young men and women are turning to the Townsend plan. They know that by retiring those over 60 will at once open the doors of opportunity and employment to them; opportunity to secure and follow the work that suits them best.

They know that under the constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they have the right to "Life, Liberty and the pursuit of happiness." And they are going to establish that life, liberty and happiness for themselves through the Townsend Plan.

Dr. Homer P. Rainey, director of the youth Commission of the Rockefeller Foundation, in the Washington Daily News, January 9, 1936, said that in a preliminary report on employment, education and delinquency, that approximately 5,600,000 youths 16 to 25, are unemployed and out of school and that 2,875,000 youths have been on relief.

These young people see modern homes, fine furniture, electric appliances, automobiles and airplanes. Youth knows that its shoes are made in factories by machinery; that its clothing is made by electric power; and all it wants can be made available to them, if

they are allowed to work. It knows that want and hunger are unnecessary and foolish in this land of plenty. It knows it can produce all its needs if given an opportunity. It is not willing to wait through the passing years to fill "dead men's shoes". They do not want a mountain camp, segregated from society, under military dictatorship and martial law.

They want a home and a place in the civil life of the nation. They want and demand the conditions which would be created by the Townsend plan. They know that in their elders are retired from active work, that stores, the factories, the farms, the transportation systems, and every active business and industry, would again seek their services, and that ability and ambition would again direct their lives. And they know that with the Townsend plan enacted into law, that in their twilight or closing years of life, there would be no threat of hunger and want, — they gave their younger years of life to honest effort in maintaining business and society under Constitutional Government.

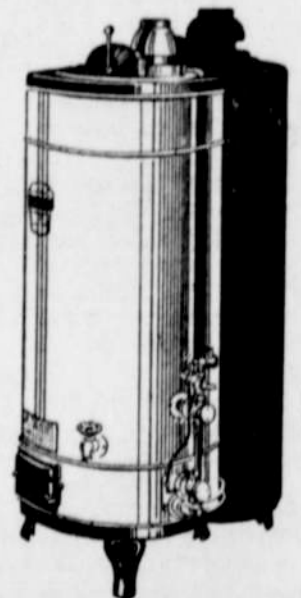
