

This Year's Car Registration Is Greatly Boosted

The tourist season is getting in flower and the registration records at the Chamber of Commerce headquarters show that tourists are much more numerous than they were last year at this date.

In the merry month of June, which went its way Tuesday to join all the Junes that ever have been the delight of fond lovers, 3,382 motorists from other states registered their autos in Ashland. Last year for the same month the registration was 2,340. That means a gain for this year over last, of 1,042.

The first six months of this year, 7,267 cars were registered here. Last year for the same period, there were 5,199 registrations. The gain this year over last was 2,068.

Travel Into State Makes Great Gain

Results of the "Sell Oregon" campaign launched several months ago are seen in the heavy influx of motor tourists this year, reports Earl Snell, secretary of state. At least 60,000 more visitors will visit Oregon in 1936 than entered the state in 1935, is his conclusion after studying the nonresident registration records of the first five months.

The "Sell Oregon" movement has been the result of the combined efforts of the Oregon State Motor association, the press of the state, the travel and information bureau of the state highway department, and the secretary of state. That it has been effective is demonstrated by the 20 per cent increase in out-of-state cars registered during the first five months of 1936. During this time 23,725 motor vehicles were listed, while the same period in 1935 brought a total registration of 19,614.

Based on the present percentage of increase, it is anticipated that more than 120,000 cars from other states will enter Oregon this year. Estimating three passengers on an average for each motor vehicle, some 360,000 tourists will visit the state.

During May the increase in registrations reached 29 per cent, with 8,834 cars checked in at the bureaus throughout the state.

100,000 Acres For Grazing Proposed

A grazing district of approximately 100,000 acres, to be located in Northern Morrow, northwestern Gilliam and northwestern Umatilla counties has been proposed by the Eastern Oregon Public Land Use committee of the Oregon State planning board, according to word received here. Assurance of cooperation for the project has been received by the committee from F. R. Carpenter, head of the division of grazing of the U. S. department of interior, according to P. M. Brandt, Corvallis, secretary of the committee.

If efforts to organize the district are successful, it would come under the administration of the Taylor Grazing act organization, and would be eligible for benefits possible under this measure, it is pointed out. Stockmen of this part of the state would benefit greatly from such a district, it is pointed out.

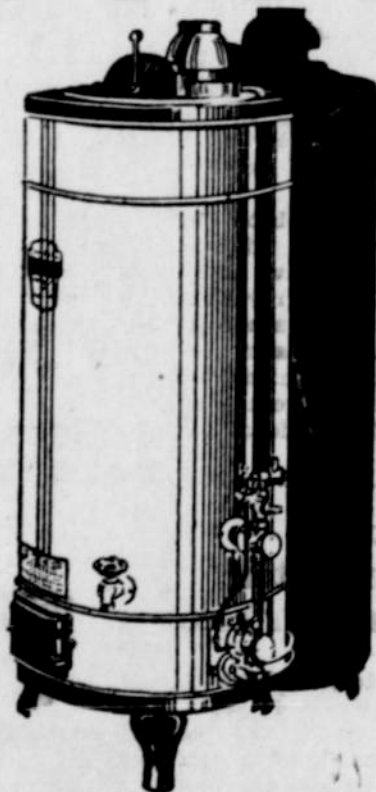

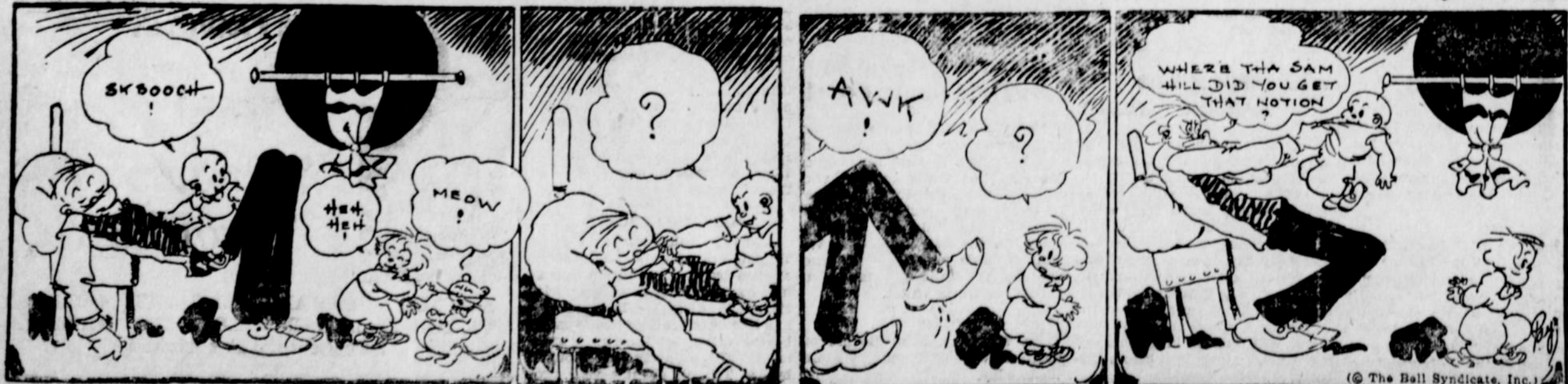
