ROOSEVELT

The editor of the Medford Mail Tribune hits the ten-penny nail square on the bean in the following editorial correspondence from New York: "Big Business, the entrenched forces of privilege and wealth, those who are fighting tooth and nail for the old order, the status quo, are all arrayed against Roosevelt and the New Deal. Roosevelt has definite policies and principles, and it is because of this he is so violently and relentlessly opposed; not because of his political methods, his nature or character as a man. He is fighting heart and soul against the Royalists of 1936, who regardless of their lip service to principles of freedom and democracy are only concerned with retarding social and economic advancement, and determined at all costs to preserve the special privileges they have so long enjoyed."

SENATOR BORAH

Senator William E. Borah still has his party colleagues guessing. Bitterly attacking monopoly and the gold standard, he made an Independence Day speech that seemed almost as defiant as the original declaration of 1776. "Congress has the right to use its constitutional powers to coin money and regulate its value," he said. "The fault has been that regulation of money has been the power of private interests, causing the depression. Congress is not utilizing its power to regulate money. Both old parties have recognized the demoralizing influence of monopolies, and included their outlawing in the respective platforms. America does not want to be controlled by monopolistic powers. Monopolies destroy our purchasing power and take over our natural resources."

TOWNSEND TOPICS

PENSIONS MUST BE SPENT IN 30 DAYS — WHY?

The Dow-Jones organization, one of the leading business statistical concerns in the United States, said: "In October 1929, a deposit of one dollar in a New York bank, was being used fast enough to do \$132.70 of work in a year."

Last October (1935) the same dollar was called upon to do annual work of only \$22.50. Although total bank deposits were approximately the same in the two months, bank deposits are simply lying idle.

When money circulates rapidly, many people have the use of it and business increases. When money circulates slowly, few people use it and business declines. When money is hoarded privately or in bank vaults, it creates no business. One of the great obstacles to business recovery today is the idle money lying in government and bank vaults — out of circulation.

People not having jobs cannot get money or credit; and not having money or credit, cannot buy what they need. There being no money in the hands of those unemployed, merchants cannot sell; and not being able to sell, they cannot buy from the factories. Factories not being able to sell, they cannot employ people out of work. And there being few commodities distributed to the unemployed, railroads haven't sufficient business to employ railroad workers.

If the \$200 per month received by pensioners was hoarded or deposited in savings banks, it would create no new business or employment. Therefore, the Townsend Plan requires every pensioner to spend his or her pension within 30 days after it is received. This keeps the money in circulation, which in turn will keep the wheels of industry moving, calling for continuous employment. Thus, by requiring that pensions be spent, the Townsend Plan operates and sustains itself on the new wealth created by the now idle money, machines, materials and men.
