Young baseball players of southern Oregon—those with ambitions toward careers in organized ball, anyway—are at last going to get their chance to tryout before expert eyes at little or no cost to themselves.

Under the supervision of the Cincinnati Reds of the National League, a training camp for youngsters between the ages of 17 and 22 will be held in Medford for one week, beginning September 28. Mickey Shader, scout for the Reds, will be in charge of the tryouts, and will be helped out by several competent coaches, all former big league players.

All that is necessary for any boy wishing to attend is that he furnish his own shoes, glove, transportation to and from Medford and room and board while there.

For Ashland, Medford and Grants Pass players, it will mean a real, honest-to-goodness Major League tryout at about a tenth of the usual expense.

Any youngsters showing enough promise to warrant it will be farmed out to one of the Reds 14 minor league teams next spring.

In glancing over the schedule as so far arranged for Jean Eberhart's SONS football team, we fail to note more than one Ashland appearance for the locals. That is the opener against Pacific college on October 3. However, there are three open dates yet to be filled, so Ashland's rabid pigskin followers will probably get to see one and maybe two more college games here this fall.

The SONS go to Grants Pass for the first time in history on October 9 with the Oregon Fresh their opponents. Klamath Falls also gets a SONS game—the Oregon Normal encounter October 15. The rest of the schedule shows the SONS at Albany on October 24; at Eureka against Humboldt Teachers on October 13; and at Monmouth against Oregon Normal again on November 7.

FISHING NEWS

In some streams and lakes the fishing has fallen off somewhat from last week-end, but in others it has improved. Consequently, the general fishing conditions remain very good. The Upper Rogue River, particularly around Hamaker Meadows is good. Catches are fair at Brown's Cabin. A few limits are being taken in Flat Creek which is classed as good. Union Creek is fair. Other tributaries, with the exception of Gingka Creek, are classed as poor.

Fish Lake on the headwaters of the South Umpqua, which may be

reached from Camp Comfort on the South Umpqua or from Hershberger on the Rogue-Umpqua Divide, is classed as fair with flies or good still fishing with salmon eggs.

Rainbow fishing at Rocky Point is good. Catches during the last week have contained 8 to 12 lb. rainbows. Baby and Trout Orenos and Andy Reekers seem to be preferred.

Lake on the Woods is fair for the average fisherman; the good fishermen are consistently taking their limits of silversides. The bass fishing using pike minnow plugs has been good.

Fish Lake has continued to yield limits of eastern brook and silversides by either trolling with flashes and night crawlers or still fishing. Fish Lake will be closed to all angling after August 15.

Four Mile lake is very good. Li-

mit catches have been reported as taken during the past week by both still fishing and trolling. The road to this lake is rough but is being worked on at the present time, and will probably be in better shape during the coming week-end than heretofore.

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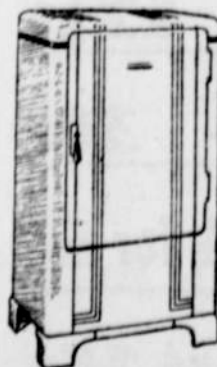
