It won't be long now until football will be the main topic of conversation up and down the main stem.

In fact in less than two weeks from today—September 1 to be exact—Forrest "Skeet" O'Connell will have his 1936 Grizzlies going through their paces for the first time.

And on September 14, Jean Eberhart's Southern Oregon Normal SONS will get together for their initial workout.

While little is known at this time in regard to just what lettermen and newcomers Eberhart will have out for his squad, a fairly accurate forecast can be made as to how the Grizzlies will probably stack up for their first battle.

Coach O'Connell, from all appearances at this early date, is stepping into what we would call a plenty sweat spot. With only four lettermen graduating from a fine last year's team, he shouldn't have much trouble producing a gang—that figures to suffer no more than two defeats, and a fighting chance at being undefeated.

Ken Schilling and Parker Tess: two grand backs, will be missing as will Pat McCarthy, guard and Ray Barker, end. But take a look at what the new coach's eye will fall on when he lines them up for the first time.

Starting in the backfield, there is big, tough, and hard hitting Steve Fowler. A plenty nice fullback. There is Leonard Warren, shifty and fast, for a halfback position and the sensational Walt Lee, the speediest one of them all, for the other halfback post.

With Hess gone, O'Connell will have to find another quarterback, one, preferably, who can also pass the pigskin. That man may be little Charlie Warren, not a letterman, but seeing some action last year.

In the line, six returning regulars strengthen the hope that this may be THE year for the Grizzlies. Bud Etzweiled and Roland Scheidereiter, both centers, will be on hand for the opening call. One of them may be shifted to a guard position to team with Bruce De Mers. At the tackles, O'Connell will have the three letterman, Cliff Bromley, and huge Bill Wimer. And at one end, Don Geitling, returns from last year.

So there it is in a nut shell. Nine returning lettermen, and with only two positions to be filled with inexperienced men. It certainly doesn't look bad for Ashland high's football chances come this fall.

Of course, the Grizzlies toughest hurdle will be Medford, which is already counting on nothing else but the state championship. We're not saying they haven't a right to do that. They lose few men from their undefeated array of last season, but after thinking over the embroglio they and our Grizzlies put up last year, we can't help but wonder if maybe there mightn't be a fine large upset around Thanksgiving time.

## FISHING NEWS

Fishing conditions in general are falling off because of the lowering water levels and the fact that the more accessible streams have been fished out. This week's report indicates that with cooler weather and the absence of the full moon of a few days ago, fishing at Diamond Lake has improved considerably. Limit catches are now being made daily by deep trolling with spinners and worms. Flies are being taken in the mouth of Silent and Short Creeks. Queen of Waters, red or blue upright flies have proved to be most attractive. Limits are also being taken in Lake Creek and the North Umpqua. In the Upper Rogue near Hamaker Guard Station and higher in Minnihaha, Flat, Crater, and Copeland Creeks the fishing has been fair. The Upper South Fork of the Rogue below Blue Cayon is classed as good, as well as the Upper South Fork of Little Butte Creek. Seven-Lakes, particularly Middle Lake and Sky Lakes, have been good during the past week for fly fishing. At Rocky Point on Klamath Lake 10 to 15 lb. rainbow are being taken regularly on Trout Orenos, Baby Orenos, and Andy Reekers. Fishing in Lake O' The Woods is fair. Some good sized silversides have been taken by both still fishing and trolling. Bass fishing is good by using pike minnow plugs and some perch have been taken still fishing with worm. Fish Lake is still classed as good; catches contain both eastern brook and silversides. This lake will be closed to angling after Saturday, August 15, for the remainder of the season. 90,000 steelhead have been planted this past week in the Upper Rogue by the Forest Service and the United States Bureau of Fisheries.

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## Today's Sermon

And what is the exceeding greatness of His power to Us-ward who believe according to the working of His mighty power, WHICH HE WROUGHT IN CHRIST WHEN HE RAISED HIM FROM THE DEAD. Eph. 1:19-20.

No one could doubt for an instant that it was a mighty power that raised Jesus from the dead. No other similar power of like effect upon human beings can be imagined. It is the acme of all power, but Paul says that as believers understand that this SAME power worketh toward us. That same power of God, unduplicated since the world began, is the power which worketh in Christians! Is it any wonder that there is a change, so wonderful, world-wide changing, that it has the effect of making radically new every relationship into which the New Born Christian is thrown. Indeed it is more of wonder that the change seems to have so little effect on the lives of those who profess the name of Jesus Christ and who say that they are new born into the Kingdom of God. Paul points out some things that happen; "You who were dead in trespasses and sins walk". No one who has ever seen an Indian fakir perform his feat of burial; but hangs breathless on the outcome. But when he comes out of his casket which has been buried in water for two hours; it seems as if the dead are walking. Nor can the world but hang breathless upon the outcome when a christian testifies of the new birth. They expect to see that which was dead walk. Were they disappointed in you? or was your life so little changed that no walking was possible, you still hung between life and death. They expect to see you walk with Christ; were you not raised with Him? Eph. 1:5. Whose relationship has been more definitely established than your relationship with Christ? The same power that raised him from the dead, has raised you from the dead; and what is more you were raised with Christ in the sense of being dead in trespasses and sins, arrived immediately or concurrently with your sense of the fact that Christ died for your sins. Thus having in you

a union with Christ in manner of resurrection (the same power worketh in you that worketh in Christ) and in sense of relationship ( you were raised together with Him) you are to walk as the exhibit of the WORKMANSHIP OF GOD. Are you an exhibit of the WORKMANSHIP OF GOD? If so does the World smile or do they know that you ARE.
