

AHS Eleven Plans Surprise Here Tomorrow

O'CONNELL HAS SPECIAL DISH FOR G. PASSERS

As Vand Lineup To Be At Peak of Form; Win May Result

Loren Tuttle's heavy and powerful Grants Pass Cavemen move in upon the Grizzlies of Skeet O'Connell tomorrow afternoon at the high school field bent upon making it two straight wins over the Ashlanders.

Kickoff time is set for 2:00 p. m. sharp.

Holding a 6-0 win over the Grizzlies in a game played earlier in the season, and victors over Klamath Falls 14-6, which ball club defeated Ashland 26-0, the invaders are decided favorites to finish the ruin that has been Ashland's season to date.

But Head Man O'Connell may have a surprise for those Cavemen. In fact, we will go out on the limb so far as to state that Head Man O'Connell and his boys have developed so much of a surprise that it will mean a win for Ashland. Yeh, a win for the Grizzlies!

You take the past records of the two clubs, compare them and work things out on a piece of paper, and you don't get anything but a Grants Pass win. And by plenty of points.

Also, you scan back and find out that the Grizzlies have scored nary a point in the last three ball games, and you are willing to bet the old shirt against the Ashlanders.

But look here:

This Ashland football team that has looked so—well, lousy—the past month, is due for a rebound. The material is certainly there, and the boys are getting up a good mad, which will undoubtedly be bad for all and sundry opponents.

And take this:

The Grants Passers, hopped to the skies and figured to be on almost an even footing with

mighty Medford last week, didn't do anything but get their ears knocked down to the tune of 31-7. That won't help the invaders any. Plenty of them are battered up, and as for their morale, well, we wouldn't give a nickel an ounce for it about this time.

Also, chew over this for awhile!

Since the Klamath Falls nightmare, the Grizzlies have had two full weeks to relax in and learn all over again how to block and tackle. Every Grizzly is in perfect shape, and that's more than can be said for the Grants Passers.

Big Steve Fowler plays tomorrow, entirely recovered from an injured ankle and an attack of flu which kept him out of the Klamath Falls game. He starts at his old fullback post.

Leonard Warren at left half; Walt Lee at right half;

and tiny, vicious tackling Charlie Warren at quarterback and safety makes up the rest of the Grizzly mail carriers.

In the line, Don Gettling and Jim McAllister open at the flanks; Cliff Bromley and Bill Wimer at the tackles; Bud Elzweiler and Jim Brad y at the guards, and Roland Scheidreiter at center.

Above is the starting Grizzly lineup, but several second stringers have looked so good in practice that it's a cinch that there will be action for more than the starting eleven.

It is not a conference battle tomorrow. Only the first meeting of the two teams counts toward the championship.

But as Ashland is already eliminated from the race, the battle takes on the same glimmer of importance that a league affair would have. A win for the Grizzlies evens up the two-game series.

Before they were stopped so rudely by the Medford Tiger, Grants Pass had won five straight ball games, and were rated the dark horse of the conference. Now they are a horse of a different color.

But they have a big, powerful grid machine. They shoot passes galore and their ground attack is not to be sneezed at. Their lone touchdown against Ashland was powered over the goal line.

With Steve Fowler in there tomorrow, Ashland will have lots of power down the middle, the same as Grants Pass. Ashland will probably have more power off and inside the ends than will Grants Pass. Because Walt Lee is tops in that wide sweep and short end-run business. And Leonard Warren is tough inside the tackles and outside them.

Ashland may pass, tomorrow. If so, you can expect to see any one of the four backs doing the pitching. They all do it when necessary, and Fowler can heave them a mile. Leonard Warren can knock your eye out at twenty paces.

So that's the way it stands. It's Ashland's next to final chance to salvage one major victory from a very disappointing season.

And we pick 'em to do it, children. They're due.

SONS TO MEET HUMBOLDT AT EUREKA TONITE

Coach Jean Eberhart and 24 of his Southern Oregon Normal football players left for Eureka, Calif., early this morning where they will tangle with Humboldt State Teachers college at Arcata tonight under the lights.

With no injuries reported from the 21-0 win over Albany college last week, Eberhart has hopes making it two straight victories for the season.

The game will be next to the last of the season for the Sons, the annual homecoming battle with Oregon Normal November 31 remaining.

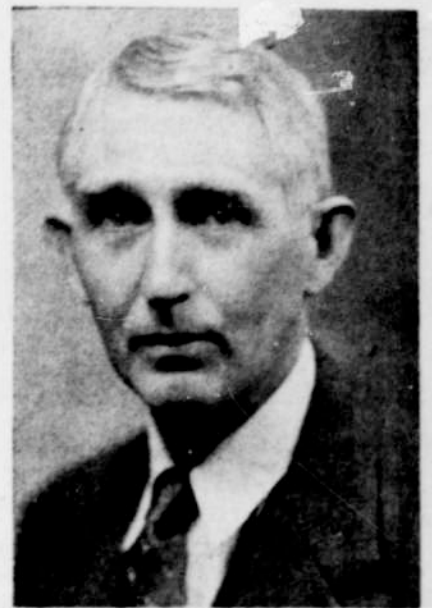
