

SONS TO PLAY WEBFEET HERE DECEMBER 19

Coach Jean Eberhart of Southern Oregon Normal attended the Northwest conference meeting in Portland last week-end, and the result was just about the sweetest basketball schedule ever produced for a SONS team.

In addition to slating games with three of that loop's teams, Eberhart came back with a pair of "honies"—Howard Hobson's University of Oregon Webfoots at Ashland December 19, and Slats Gill's Beavers of Oregon State at Corvallis, December 28.

The entire schedule lists 26 ball games, with Don Faber's Albany college Pirates being met four times, twice there and twice here; Linfield, last year's conference champs, also being played four times on a home and home basis; and Willamette being faced two and, possibly, three times.

Oregon Normal, the Sons ancient and bitter rival, will be played four times, with the locals winding up their regular season against the Wolves at Monmouth.

On the second team, four Ashlanders won places. In the backfield, Leonard Warren and Walt Lee were placed at right half and quarterback, respectively. Don Gettling won the right end spot and Bud Etzweiler was placed at left guard.

Steve Fowler, Ashland's booming fullback, received honorable mention, and would undoubtedly have been voted to that post on the first team if he had performed all year like he did in the Medford game.
