Hubert To Compose Ten Interpretative Musical Numbers

The pageant will be a pompous affair with 1000 voices in its choir. The extravaganza will be presented under lights at the Grants Pass football field some time next May. Work on the project already is underway.

Ten tableaux will be built, one for each scene, and the action and music will be continuous. A chor-

us of 1,000 voices will be a feature and the music will be played by the Grants Pass high school orchestra under the direction of Martin Trepte.
