

Double Feature Slated Normal Gym Tonight

ASHLAND PASS TO START OFF TWIN PROGRAM

Booked as favorites for the first time this year, Ashland high's Grizzlies will attempt to cling to their conference lead by downing the Grants Pass Cavemen at the normal gymnasium at 7:30 o'clock tonight in a preliminary to the Sons-Mt. Angel melee scheduled for 8:30 p. m.

The Grizzlies are booked as favorites primarily because of their remarkable showing against Klamath Falls Pelicans, while on the other hand the Klamath quint trounced Grants Pass last week 41-22. A tendency of overconfidence prevails among members of the local team and, unless they show a changed attitude tonight, they may be in for some rough going. The situation is reminiscent of the Grants Pass-Ashland series last year. Ashland had trounced the Cavemen twice but because of overconfidence, the Cavemen managed to nose out the Lithians by four or five points to win their only conference game. This procedure easily could be repeated.

Tonight's game will be a further test of endurance for both squads. The embroglio will compare Ashland's relative strength with other conference teams, save Medford, and will show their conditioning. Playing on a court large as the normal floor likely will tire both teams.

Coach O'Connell said last night he will start his regular lineup of Tiny Jones, center; Lee and C. Warren, forwards; Fowler and Scheidreiter at guard posts.

GRIZZLY WIN OVER KLAMATH GIVES THRILLS

Saturday night in the Junior High gymnasium the Ashland High school Grizzlies accomplished what had been thought impossible. They smashed and tore down the floor to pull a close one out of the fire when they lowered the highly touted Klamath Falls Pelicans in conference standings by walking on them 21-20 in one of the most thrilling finishes ever witnessed by goggle-eyed fans on an Ashland basketball court.

Not since five or six years ago when Ashland nosed Medford out by one point has such a thrilling fray materialized. Klamath started fast but the Grizzlies picked up momentum as the game progressed. They were behind 12-10 at half time. With the tempo increasing, Referee Deal found reason to call many fouls as a result of which Giovanini, Pelican star, was ousted with four personals. Displaying a conquering spirit that was not to be denied, the Grizzlies completely outfought their taller opponents and, as a result, gained top spot in the conference—as they have the past three years.

With a third quarter lead of 18-17, the locals tenaciously hung on, even though Klamath tried desperately to gain a substantial lead. With 30 seconds left to play the Grizzlies held a lead of 21-20 but this lead was periled when Fowler, in his desperation to block a Pelican attempt, committed a foul on Putman just as the final gun sounded. Putman, in his one chance to tie up the score and send the game into an overtime period, lacked several inches of propelling the ball far enough for a successful conversion.

It was Jones who scored the winning points for Ashland, with Fowler high for his team with 8 and Giovanini high for the game with 10.

It is doubtful whether he will see action in this series. The same injury kept Hardy out of last Saturday's Willamette encounter which the SONS lost.

Bill Hoxie, lanky forward, also is recuperating from an injured ankle. Ted Schopf has been taking treatments for a sore muscle in his leg but probably will be ready to go. Scroggins, latest addition to the sick list, will not see action this week. Scroggins spent most of the week in bed with the flu and Eberhart is planning to let him recover completely before again playing him.

Little stress has been put on this week's games, light practices having been scheduled with Coach Eberhart using this week as one of recuperation for the entire team which has suffered numerous in-

juries from their many recent games.

One advantage the SONS will have is experience. Mt. Angel, although composed of four veterans on the first five, has played but two games this season. A \$50,000 gymnasium recently was completed for Mt. Angel and consequently, few games had been scheduled early. Their official season opened last Sunday.
