DETAILS VAGUE IN FREAK APPLAGATE AUTO DEATH

Hazy minded after an alleged drinking spree, Howard Gibson, his wife and brother, Earl Gibson, Applegate residents, could give no coherent account of the accident in which Joe Tole, 51, lost his life in a fall from the Gibson auto following a dance at Applegate Saturday night. Tole apparently had been riding with the Gibsons and, upon falling from the car was not missed until the car had traveled about 75 yards. He died shortly after arrival at a Grants Pass hospital. The accident having occurred in Jackson county, Tole's body, bearing head injuries and cuts, was brought to Medford where an autopsy and complete investigation of the tragedy will be held.

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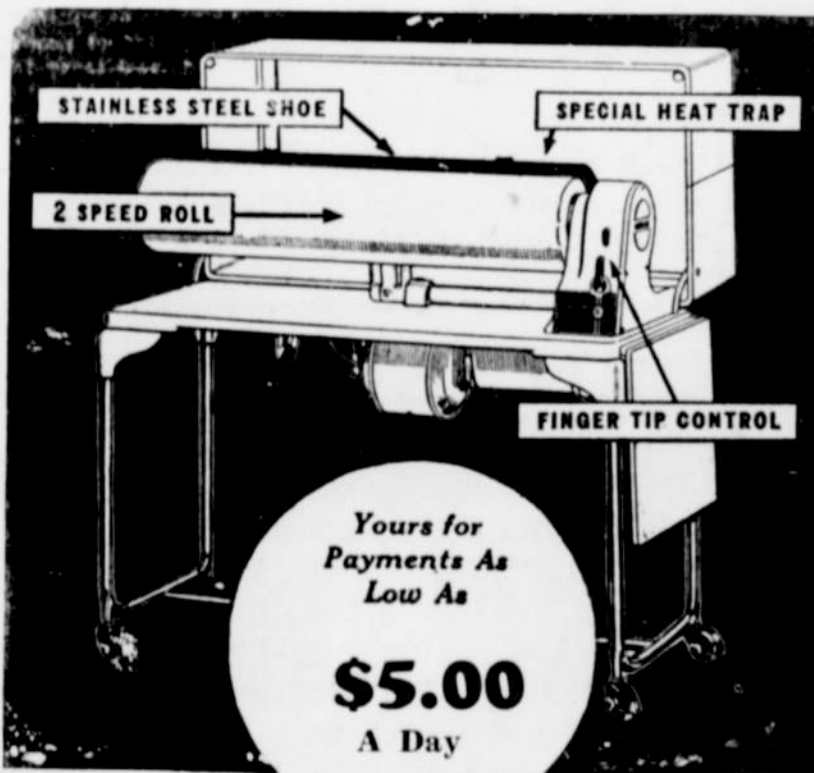


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
