FIELDS IS FREED OF MURDER RAP

Wednesday when Fields, on his own behalf, and other witnesses including Chief of Police Talent and Clint Baughman of Ashland and the defendant's eldest son, Ernest Fields, 27, of Bonanza, declared that Mow and the woman had carried on an illicit love affair for some time, causing domestic troubles which had been arbitrated by the law previously and that Fields shot only after Mow had threatened to "break every bone in his body."

Fields' story withstood rigorous cross-examination by District Attorney Newman Wednesday and both sides rested with summations by counsel occurring Thursday.

Fields was released immediately and, according to Newman, seemed to have taken the outcome very seriously with all indications that he had learned his lesson well and would be reluctant to resort to violence in future trouble.

Hunting Out Sports

IN PUTTING the account of Ashland's win over Glendale in the obituary column last Monday, Medford sportswriters started a habit which they may find very hard to break. It will probably be particularly appropriate in the issue of June 21 because, if the Lithians play anywhere near the standard they set against the Loggers, the game will mean sudden death to any hopes the befuddled Craters may still cherish.

Medford's good fortune in procuring Duke Hankinson to spark the team was short lived when it was discovered that the newly acquired University of Oregon third baseman was injured in making a home run which featured his performance in the Roseburg game which Medford won 6-2, and as a consequence will be out of the play for the balance of the season.

On the other hand it appears virtually certain that the Webfoots' contribution to Ashland, Bob Hardy and Cliff McLean, will remain with the local nine which has awarded them honorary degrees of Master of Strikeouts and Doctor of Basehits, respectively.

Professors Hardy, M. S. O. and McClean, D. B. H., head a faculty off associate instructors from the athletic department of SONS and will be teaching some mighty tough courses in Advanced Baseball this semester. From that angle it is very regrettable that Ashland will have no opportunity to meet Crescent City again during the first half of the slate.

The circuit leading Chinooks have a very good chance to wind up the initial session with an unmarred record. They have yet to play Glendale, Grants Pass, and Roseburg all of whom they have beaten previously and none of whom have shown any notable improvement as the season has progressed. Likeliest obstacle in their otherwise smooth pathway will be the Loggers, who showed last Sunday that, although they were defeated by Ashland, they are not throwing any ball games.

To Glendale's additional advantage will be the fact that Crescent City will have to leave the coast town diamond, which reputedly is so spongy that it would bog a jack-snipe, for the spotty Glendale playing field where the infield is harder than Irish confetti and outfielders have to have a map, a bird dog, and a search warrant to find a ball in the high weeds.

The second half will see Ashland travel to the coast for the starting game, July 11, and then the fun will begin. These Lithian batters have suddenly become hitters and once they get on base the Californians will have to install a bug patrol station on every sack to even slow them down. McClean

Needless to say, Hardy and McClean have a certain something all their own but the rest of the boys also have developed a spectacular brand of baseball to match them which will be tougher for their opponents to swallow than oysters in the r-less months.

Not being able to head off Crescent City this half, the Lithians will have to take their solace in wallowing Glendale next Sunday in the second section of their 18 hole match, leaving clear marks all over the base routes on Medford's new turf field the following week, and winding up the first stanza June 27 at Grants Pass with a win to avenge the shattering which suffered when the Merchants came here.
