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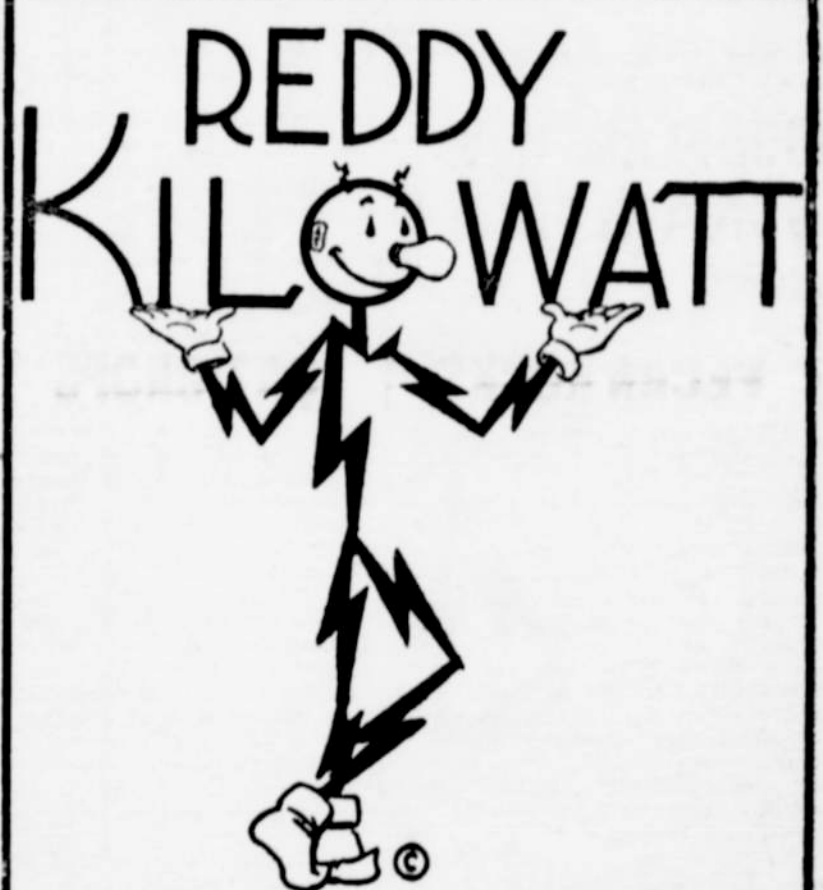
SOME of the ideas forthcoming in this column are not practical for daily use, nor are they useful to every individual. But to start in this week correctly, here is an old, old idea made new and combined with a severe lecture to all you ladies and lasses that are not too energetic this lazy weather. Are you ready?

Then hear the story of the lovely young lady who groomed herself beautifully, preparatory to putting on a perfectly elegant dress, and then wasn't careful to see that it was pressed to perfection. Result: a slightly crumpled, warm look which caused both young lady and gown to hit a new low as far as charm was concerned.

It is too hot to do a lot of pressing, and yet we cannot manage that bandbox appearance unless both dress and slip are ironed perfectly. So, because be charming we must, we shall have to find new short-cuts to making pressing efficient. For instance, that lightweight wool skirt that you wear with cool blouses need not go through a steaming process before it is perfect, nor need you content yourself with a haphazard job of pressing it on the wrong side. Get a heavy piece of brown wrapping paper. Place it over the right side of the skirt, brush it lightly with a damp cloth, and press quickly until the paper is dry—which is in less than no time. You'll be surprised how much faster your wool pressing will go, if you try this.

Those silks that stick to the iron stick no more when put to this self-same treatment, only see to it that your paper is just dampened and no more. As for cottons, the damp cloth is still best, and if you use a good hot iron it need not take too much of your time; and the effect is so much better. Remember now, this is imperative to charm and good grooming!

Have you been looking for a new way to fasten the front of a plain-colored dress which is split from neck-line to waist? WHY NOT get two contrasting shades of chiffon and make tabs six inches long and three inches wide with the ends cut slant-wise, tack one color on one side and the other color on the other side of the split at intervals of about four inches and simply square-knot them together. Then to make the effect really complete twist lengths of each color together and



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tie the resulting rope around your head, leaving the ends floating in the breeze at the back. P. S.: Get a good piece of chiffon. The cheap kinds will sag into strings after a wearing or two.
