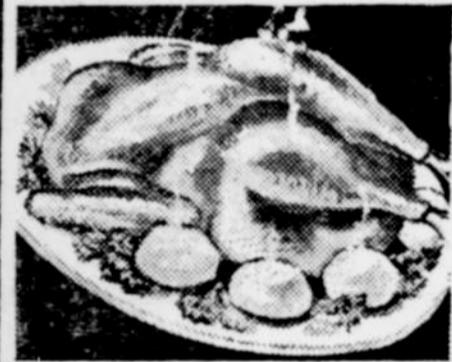
FORMER LOCAL MAN SIGNS FOR HAWAII

for the Union Oil company until last spring, when he was succeeded by Lowell Brown.

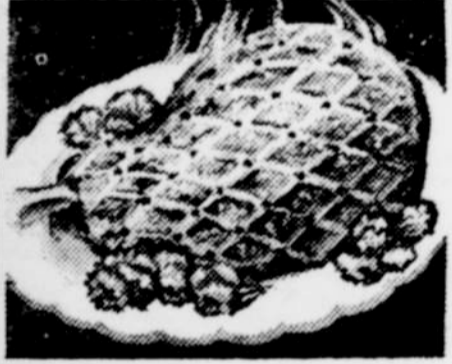

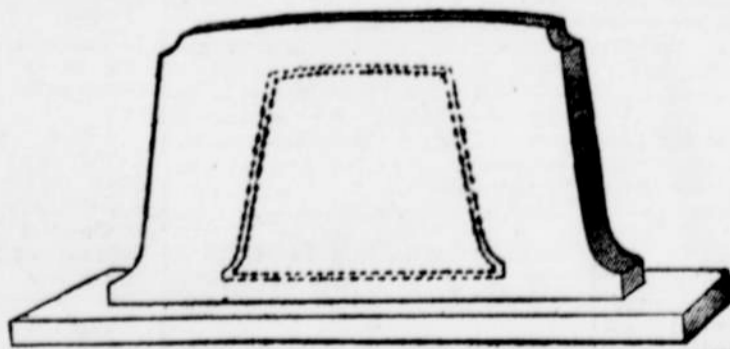
