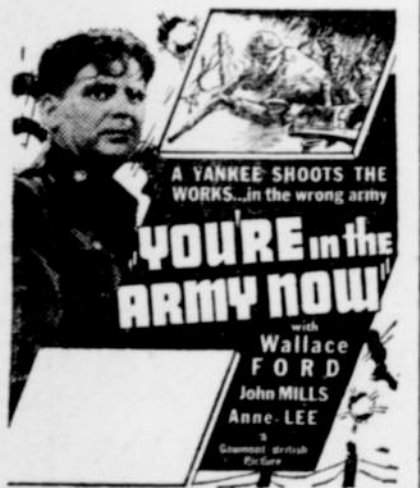

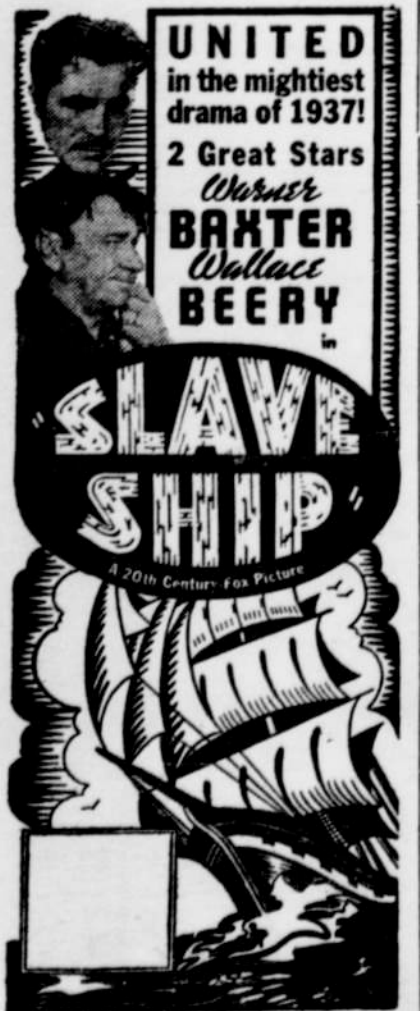

ANTI-AIRCRAFT EQUIPMENT DUE

onds as painfully as he can sunburn his back in a half hour on the beach.

The sound locators are composed of two enormous sets of horns which are used to locate planes in the air, particularly at night.

The anti-aircraft gun battery is equipped with four three-inch mobile anti-aircraft guns, each weighing eight tons. They are towed by a 10-ton, 15-gear shift, 174-horsepower truck called a prime mover. A fifth prime mover tows an instrument trailer weighing nearly 11 tons. This trailer carries the various fire-control instruments and upon it are mounted the power plant and generators providing the alternating current used to energize the electric fire-control systems.

The machine gun battery is equipped with eight .50 caliber machine guns. This gun is a very powerful weapon, firing 600 rounds a minute and having an effective range of over one mile. It is water cooled, weighs 66 pounds and is mounted on an anti-aircraft mount.

Lieut. Col. C. M. Thiele is commander of the regiment. Present with it are 15 regular army officers and 500 enlisted men. Six reserve officers are attached to it for training.

Eighty-two trucks and trailers will make up the motor column when it goes through Ashland.

Durham was good for an extra base but Heyne went out, Durham to Patterson, to retire the side.

Keeton's strikeout in the second was followed by Balding's single to right field. Balding took second on a wild pitch by Heyne but got no farther when Durham fanned and Hardy fled out to Ostrom in center field.

The Merchants took to the plate for their first surge of power in the third which started when McCarthy singled past second. The next man, Ray, batted right into a double play, however, when Durham took his fly and relayed it to first to catch McCarthy. Undismayed, Machado got a single to left field and ambled home ahead of veteran Al Drolette who clouted a leisurely home run. Ostrom took first when Hall failed to hang onto a fly, but Hardy whizzed three strikes past Blacksmith to send Grants Pass back to the field.

The inning expired rather suddenly as Schopf, Hall and Patterson were put out one-two-three to retire Ashland.

Failing to dodge Hardy's scatter-arm delivery in the fourth, Hartman again took first with an injured air and considerable muttering to himself and got to second when Pitman put a single into left field. Both men advanced on Heyne's sacrifice bunt but McCarthy grounded out and Ray whiffed.

Again three Ashland batters bit the dust as McLean fled out and both Kannasto and Keeton whiffed.

Machado got his third straight hit in the Clifmateers' half of the fifth, a single to left again. Drolette walked and Ostrom went out, Hardy to Patterson. Blacksmith got on with a fielders' choice which, coupled with an error by Durham, allowed Machado to score and Drolette to advance to third. Hartman was caught out at first on a mixed-up affair which saw Schopf apparently put Blacksmith out at second, only to have the umpire's decision overrule the play and call Hartman out instead. A wild pitch by Hardy let Drolette come home and the inning reached the half-way point as Pitman fanned.

Keeping up their acquired rou-
