Prayer and conference meeting Wednesday night, 7:30 o'clock.

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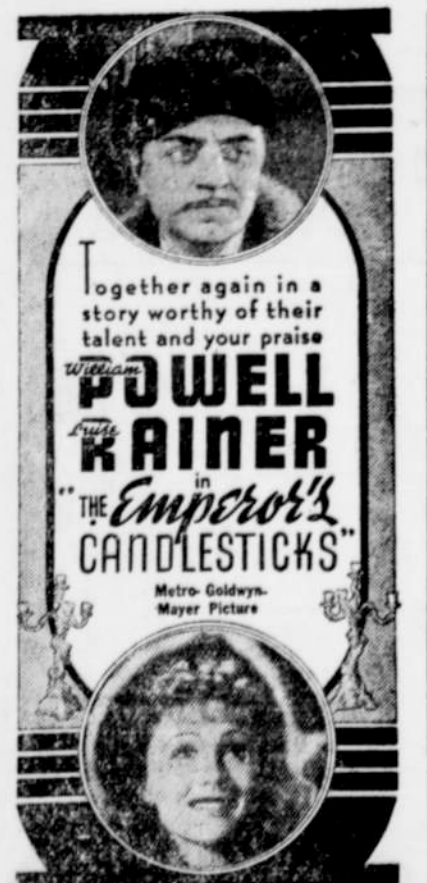

CRESCENT CITY ENDANGERS TOP SPOT IN LEAGUE

Treating fans to as exciting a baseball game as has filled an afternoon here lately, Crescent City beat the Lithians Sunday 6-4. Coming up from behind in the first frame, Ashland took a two-run lead in the second and then only got one man on base in the eighth and ninth innings as Mike Koll tightened down with five strikeouts, while Bob Hardy fell apart during the same sessions with five hits and four runs, the last scoring from third on his own error, a balk.

Right from scratch the Chinooks took it upon themselves to prove that the local port-sider could be hit. Matson, lead-off man, went out, Ager to Patterson, but Orv Framsted, heavy hitter of the league, clouted a beautiful grounder to center field for three bases. He was followed by Spann, who put a single to left field, scoring Framsted. Miller then laid another one-bagger into center, and Spann crossed the plate when Reynolds poked one behind second base. Miller was caught out at home on a fielder's choice which set Fern on first. Loffer drew a walk, and Arvedi fanned to retire the side with two runs to their credit.

Ted Schopf, first up for Ashland in the starting stanza, slapped a single into right field as the Lithians opened their reply to the Chinook onslaught. Ager whiffed. Patterson put another single into right center and both men advanced when Catcher Arvedi let the ball go by him for an error. Framsted muffed McLean's fly to center field and Schopf scratched the plate for the first Ashland tally. Patterson and McLean took an extra base apiece on Arvedi's second error, Brown grounded out, short to first, and Phil Keeton became the hero of the day when he lofted a double out of the park over left field, scoring Patterson and McLean and giving the local lads a one-run lead. Hall's grounder was fielded, pitcher to first, to end the frame.

Koll struck out, Matson got a single to center but was put out, Patterson to Schopf, while trying to steal second, and Framsted got the same treatment, McLean to Balding after he had staked a claim to first base on Schopf's error.

In the Ashland share of the second inning Balding rang the bell first with a line drive down third base for a single. He took second on Hardy's well-placed sacrifice bunt, stole third, and scored on Schopf's long fly to Framsted in center field. Ager hit safely but was caught out off second for the third out as the Chinook catcher chucked the pill to Matson at second.

Crescent City got only three men on base in the third, fourth, fifth, sixth and seventh innings. Loffer and Koll rating singles in the fourth and Koll taking a base on balls in the seventh. Only Loffer got as far as second.

The Chinooks pounced on the hapless Lithians again in the eighth after the listless mid-game. Spann fanned, then Miller concentrated on center field again with a single. He scored as Reynolds put a triple into right field. Fern grounded a single into the same spot and, as Hall found it too greasy to handle correctly, took third base, scoring Reynolds. Loffer sent a fly back of second base but Schopf scurried out from short stop position and took it for the put-out, whereupon Deo,

who had come into the game in the seventh frame, rapped a single which bounded over Patterson's head down the first base line, scoring Fern. Koll hit a single but was caught for the final out in the eighth as Matson took first on a fielder's choice.

After three quick Ashland outs in the final session Framsted came up for Crescent City and poled a two-bagger into left field. He stole third and was summoned home by the umpire as Hardy dropped the ball during his wind-up for a balk. Spann, Miller and Reynolds were fielded out to end the first half of the ninth. Ashland came to bat to suffer three strikeouts by Balding, Hardy and Schopf to end the game.
