

ALUMNI, HIGH GRIDDERS TIE

Weakened by departure of Cliff Bromley, Bill Wimer and Pete Nutter, ex-students of AHS nevertheless assembled 10 football huskies and, aided by Marvin Ring, high school reserve who filled in to make up the team, piled up an estimated total of nearly twice as many first downs as the Grizzles grid warriors in a game played Monday afternoon on the high school field and, although unable to score themselves, succeeded in holding the high school offensive to midfield throughout the tilt.

Held by lack of practice to a repertoire of four plays, the old grads were declared by Coach Skeet O'Connell of the high school to be the toughest alumni outfit to face the prep gridders in recent years. They had a hard time penetrating the high line for yardage but used passes and sweeps con-

sistently to get far into the Grizzles backfield. Hampered by sloppy ball handling in the first half, the old boys opened up in the last canto and hung onto the offensive doggedly, allowing the high school team to play the ball but two brief intervals. An attempted scoring drive started by Keeton's long forward pass to Walt Lee advanced the pigskin to the high school 12-yard line where it bogged down in a flurry of unsuccessful passes.

The high school offense was distinguished chiefly for its inability to click for more than about one consecutive play, although on defense Steve Fowler got off some beautiful punts and Bob Gregory, reserve right halfback, Tom Gettling, substitute left end, and Kenneth Bell, right tackle, managed to get through the alumni line and spill ball carriers for substantial losses.

Phil Keeton, left end and spark plug of the grads' attack, went on record with the first injury for the current season when, with seconds to go till final whistle, he was tackled back of the line by Jones and Gettling, high school ends, as he threw a pass, and got a broken lower jaw for his trouble. Keeton's chin cracked down on Jones' knee with the resulting painful fracture which will have the ex-Grizzles star eating soup for several months.

Intensive practice was held Tuesday afternoon by O'Connell, who drilled his boys for several hours in an effort to polish the rough spots so that the Grizzles will be in good shape to spill the strong Weed team which will open the local interscholastic football season here Saturday afternoon.

Starting lineup for the high school was Charlie Warren, quarterback; Fowler, fullback and signal caller; McNair, right half; Furman Carter, left half; Tiny Jones, right end; Kenneth Bell, right tackle; Weaver, right guard; Scheiderer, center; Brady, left guard; Schilling, left tackle; Jessell, left end; Bob Gregory went in for McNair late in the third quarter and Forsythe and Gettling replaced Weaver and Jessell, respectively, as the fourth session began.

For the alumni, the backfield was composed of Leonard Warren, fullback; Bill Hoxie, quarterback; Dean Warren, right half, and Walt Lee, left half. Jim McCollister was in at right end; Mayberry, right tackle; Bud Etzweiler, right guard; Joe King, center; Marvin Ring, left guard; LeRoy McNeil, left tackle, and Keeton, left end.
