Weed Dumps Ashland High 12-0 In Opening Game Here Saturday

Weed high school used a perfect passing offense and an air-tight defense to take their first game ever won from an Oregon team by beating the Ashland high eleven last Saturday on the local grid-iron by a score of 12-0.

Led by a colored halfback, Fletcher, who shoveled short passes over the line, flipped long ones past the Ashland backfield and ran like a deer if cornered, the Cougars scored their total in the first half, Aquistapace going over standing up in the first quarter and Fullback Chiodo toting the pill 30 yards to pay dirt in the second quarter. The first try for point after touchdown was blocked and the second went wild of the uprights.

The Californians were in scoring position and piled up a greater number of first downs in the last half but a gradual tightening of the Ashland line and several last-chance tackles by Quarterback Charlie Warren stopped their drives short of the goal line.

For Ashland Warren was outstanding for short gains through the line and Steve Fowler shone in the first half with some splendid long range punts.

Probably the most exciting play for local fans came late in the game when Fowler threw a pass over left side of the line to Furman Carter who gained 30 yards to midfield before being run out of bounds. Four subsequent plays failed to net a first down.

LOCAL ELEVEN IMPROVES FOR SECOND GAME

BENT on doing more good in their second whack at a northern California team, Coach Skeet O'Connell's Ashland high Grizzlies will go into the Yreka game here at 2 o'clock tomorrow afternoon at a slightly better than even chance to defeat the Miners.

Weakened somewhat at the first of the week by the loss of Weaver and Bell, guards, from injuries, and Tiny Jones, who resigned from his end post, the local team saw their ranks bolstered materially later by an influx of new blood which raised the roster to a new high of 35 players last night.

O'Connell has drilled several new offensive plays into the heads of his warriors this week and also has had them giving everything they have on defense, both in actual scrimmage and against a newly-acquired tackling dummy.

Yreka will bring a strong squad north for the fray headed by Halfback Gordon Alphonse, who slugged over a touchdown after the team had staged a 50-yard drive down the field to defeat McCloud, 7-0, last Friday.

For Ashland Bob Gregory likely will get the starting call at right halfback position for his work as a substitute in the Weed game. Forsythe will take Weaver's place at right guard, and Getting will be in at right end for Jessell, who will be shifted to Jones' place at the left end of the line.

Brady probably will start at left tackle, Bruce Schilling left guard, Newbury right tackle, Warren quarterback, Fowler full, Carter left half, and Scheideleiter center.

Other veterans on the Ashland squad are Curtis, McNair and Stewart.

Following a morning spent in jury selection, the case went to jurors late in the day and their decision could not be learned at a late hour last night. Attorney George Codding represented Wilkins.

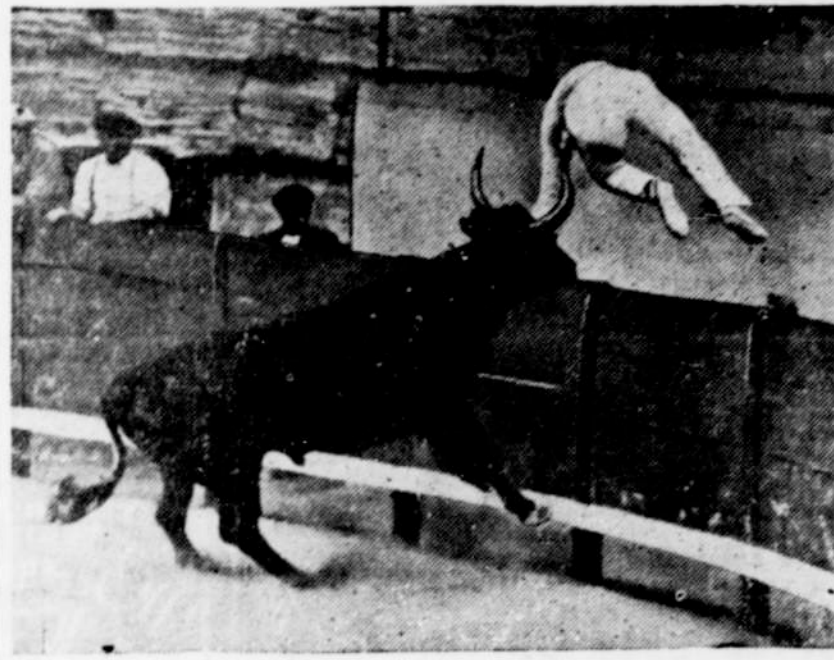
PREACHERS TO MEET

In the past, everything has gone with the juniors, from a variety of line plays to tricky passes, reverses and end runs.

In a half-length scrimmage played under actual game conditions against the Grizzlie second string last night, the juniors scored one touchdown while the high gridders pushed over three. McNeely, junior high fullback, made their score.
