## Gridsters Emerge From Cocoons In 13-0 Yreka Defeat

Exceeding even the most optimistic hopes of local fans, Coach Skeet O'Connell's fighting Grizzlies scored two touchdowns in the opening quarter, held off a goal-ward thrust of their opponents in the second, allowed the visitors the ball but once in the third session and played on better than even terms in the last quarter to defeat the Yreka high school Miners, 13-0, on the local gridiron Saturday.

Up and coming throughout with a smashing, versatile offense, the locals also demonstrated a surprising strength on defense to hold the Yreka team to about half the yardage gained by Ashland and less than half as many first downs.

The Grizzlies started the game with a bang when they got down under Scheidegger's long kick-off to nail Kostis, Yreka receiver, on Yreka's six-yard line as he fumbled the ball. One play failed to gain for the Californians and on the second the ball was fumbled back of the goal line when Fowler smashed into a Miner back as he attempted to kick. Joe Jessel fell on the bouncing ball for six points for Ashland. The kick was wide in an attempt to convert.

Scheidegger again kicked off but Yreka fumbled on their own 32 yard line and Ashland recovered to start towards the goal again. Carter and Fowler advanced almost to a first down but two successive five-yard offside penalties set the ball back on the 34 with the count fourth down and 12 yards to go. Bob Gregory then hauled around left end in a dazzling sweep which was inches short of a first down. Yreka took over but on the first play Williams fumbled and Bruce Schilling recovered on the 18. Two plays carried the ball to the eight-yard stripe, a lateral, Warren to Carter, netted six yards and Carter plunged the last two yards for the locals' second touchdown. The kick was good, making the score 13-0.

Yreka opened strongly in the second quarter, making a 30-yard drive which was hard to halt, but directly after Ashland got the ball, little Charlie Warren turned in a 25-yard broken-field dash which was one of those "he's up, he's down" affairs which make football announcers the most misunderstood people on earth. Some beautiful plays were shown by Carter, Warren and Fowler then, followed by an exchange of punts and the interception of Fowler's pass by a Yrekan who was halted on the Ashland 32-yard marker as the gun ended the half.

During the third quarter the Grizzlies allowed Yreka to carry the ball for a meager total of only 15 yards and spent the rest of the time in two drives which saw spectacular laterals and a series of dashes carry the ball to the Yreka three-yard line only to stop on downs.

Yreka managed to take the ball to the Ashland 45 in the final session but a bad pass and two fumbles gave the locals the edge and the ball for three successive drives, the Grizzlies being on the Yreka 20 as the game ended.

Warren, quarterback; Fowler, full; Carter, left half; Gregory, right half; Gettling and Jessel, ends; Forsythe and Schilling, guards; Brady and Newbury, tackles, and Scheidegger, center, started the game for Ashland. 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## Ralph L. Wardle Dies On Train Near Gerber

Ralph L. Wardle, veteran Southern Pacific conductor and resident of Ashland for more than 30 years, died suddenly from a heart attack Tuesday night near Gerber, Calif., on a train enroute to his home here.

He had spent the last two weeks vacationing in southern California and Mexico and had been recounting his experiences to T. W. Sanford, local man who also was a passenger on the train, when Sanford, who had looked away for an instant, turned again to notice Wardle slumped down in his seat apparently in a faint. Unable to bring him to consciousness, trainmen summoned a doctor at Willows who pronounced him dead.

The body was taken to Red Bluff and later to Sacramento where funeral services will be held this afternoon under the direction of the Sacramento lodge, BPOE. The deceased had been a member of the local Elks lodge since shortly after his arrival in Ashland.

Ralph Lawrence Wardle was born in Sacramento July 14, 1878. Since coming to Ashland he had established many friendships and was respected by his fellow workers in the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen.

Besides his wife, who resides at the family residence at 70 Third street, he is survived by his daughter, Mrs. Marshall J. Shields and his grandson, William Maurice Shields, Vancouver, Wash.; two sisters, Mrs. Ruby Joy of Eureka, Calif., and Mrs. Anna King, Sacramento, and a half-brother, also of Sacramento.
