SALVATION MAY REOPEN STATION

City councilmen voted Tuesday night to authorize City Attorney Frank Van Dyke to write William Hubbard of Los Angeles, recent purchaser of lots on Siskiyou boulevard for a home and auto court site valued at \$20,000, expressing council hesitancy at granting his request to be allowed to cut a piece out of the esplanade in front of the lots to facilitate cross-street entrance to the place.

Fear of establishing a precedent detrimental to beauty of Ashland's south entrance and to traffic was given as reason for turning down the request. City dads also unofficially approved a suggestion made by Capt. Durham of the Medford Salvation Army office that the Army be granted free rent in the old Fourth street mission building and certain funds now used under city dispensation so that some elderly couple could reopen the mission and care for transients. Chief of Police Talent, Councilman Guy Applewhite and Mrs. Sam McNair of the Red Cross were named as a committee to consider the proposal.

SQUADS TO PLAY UNDER MEDFORD LIGHTS AT 8 P.M.

THE valiant SONS eleven will take to the Medford turf field at 8 o'clock tonight cocked and primed to chart their first 1937 victory when they play a strong team of Oregon State college Rooks. The local Teachers, tied by Albany in their first start and humbled by Humboldt and the U of O Frosh, showed miraculous improvement in holding the powerful Monmouth gridders to a 6-6 win last Saturday and, according to team members, expect to give the Orange freshmen their toughest battle of the year.

Scorning secrecy, Jean Eberhart, normal school mentor, admits that he will use his hole-in-the-wall from start to finish and that Al Simpson and Al Esselstrom, star fingers, will be instructed to crowd the air lanes with footballs all evening. Last week the two veterans found big Walt Sether a willing and efficient receiver for more than 75 per cent of passes attempted.

Simpson at fullback, Esselstrom at left halfback, Ray Nelson at quarter and Jack Hudson, a driving flash, right half, will compose the SONS starting backfield.

The linemen will include Sether right end; Bud Butler, right tackle; Don Brace, right guard; Al Plasep, center; Everett Sandberg, left guard; Justin Cary, left tackle; and Ken Schilling, left end. Big guns for the Rooks are Kenneth (Rowdy) Dow, triple-threat fullback, and Bob Olson, former Medford star backfield ace. Starters for the Staters are Dow, fullback; Mehlfhof, left half; Hergert, right half; Tomich, quarter; Ferris and Swanson, ends; Younce and Sears, tackles; Lindsay and Volkman, guards, and Pritchett, center.

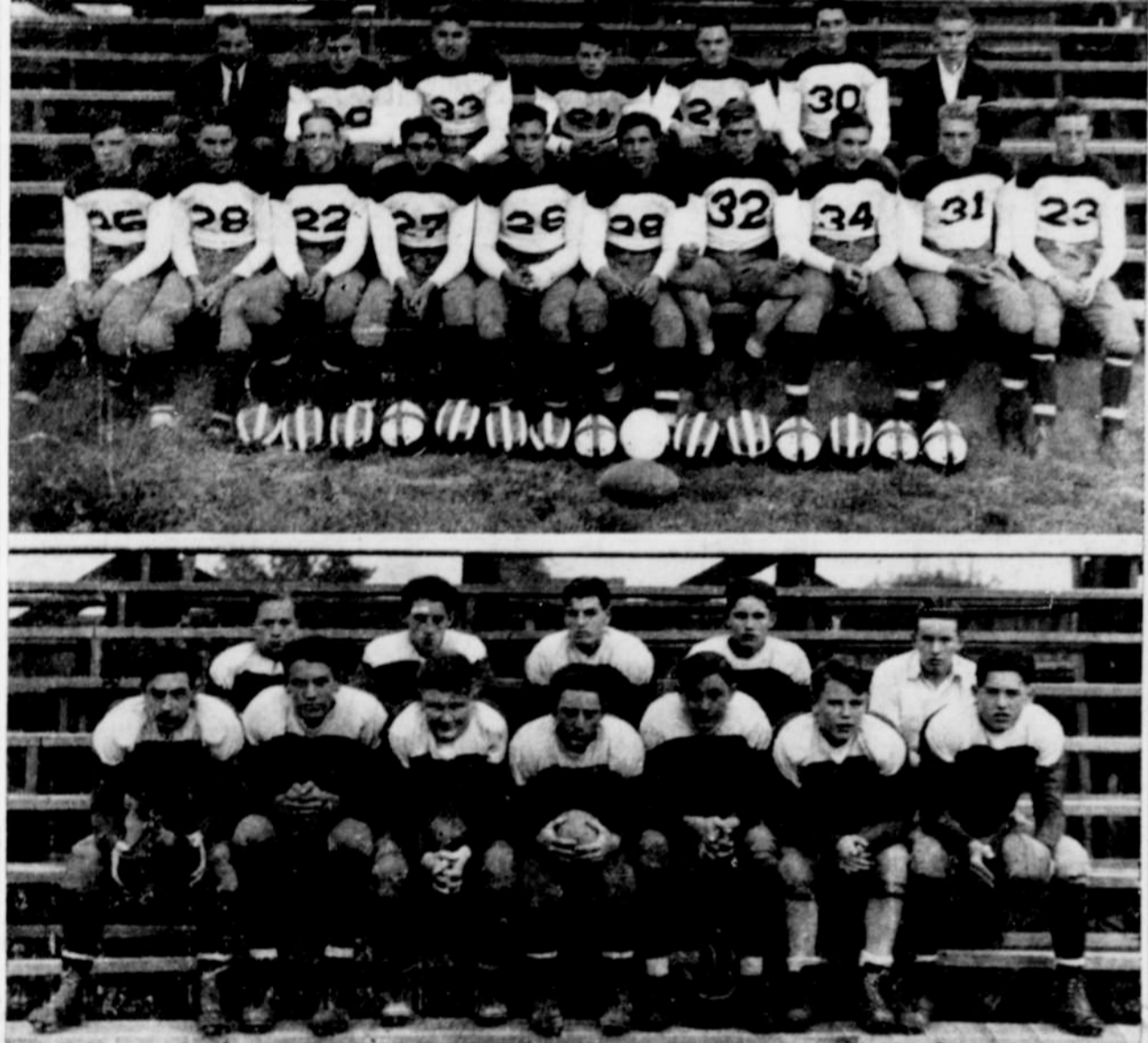

POLICE URGE BROADER USE OF LICENSES

CHIEF OF POLICE C. P. TALENT yesterday stated, in correcting misquotations made early this week, that a committee governing licensing of businesses and activities met and acted in 1935, and at that time made provision for the licensing of pinball machines (since outlawed) and card tables. Fees for the latter, which are still effective, are \$25 per year for the first table in each establishment and \$2.50 for each additional table.

Talent also recommends licenses for outside firms selling and delivering in Ashland, for wood peddlers, reserved parking space for taxis, licensing legitimate devices replacing pinball machines, peddlers, outside advertising salesmen and second-hand stores. The last named was at the suggestion of proprietors of such businesses. (Continued on page 6)

MEDFORD PLANS ARMISTICE DAY PROGRAM, FETE

One of the biggest and best patriotic celebrations to be held in southern Oregon for many years is anticipated when the annual Armistice day observance opens in Medford next Thursday morning, November 11.

Numerous committees of Medford post No. 15 of the American Legion have been hard at work for several weeks preparing a real schedule of entertainment for the day and last reports indicate that all is in readiness for the big event.

Included in the day's program will be hourly street stunts starting at 9 a. m., daylight fireworks with a salute to Armistice hour at 11 a. m., the annual patriotic parade at 11:05, dutch lunch for ex-service men at the Legion dugout at noon, special matinees at all theaters, the gridiron classic, Medford vs. Ashland high schools, free entertainment at the Legion dugout and the crowning event of the day, the annual Armistice ball and floor show at the Oriental Gardens, with music by Archie Legg and his famous recording orchestra.

Legion scrip will be accepted for all attractions of the day and evening, including the football game and dance. Ashland post No. 14, American Legion, is participating in the celebration and will be represented in the parade with their Kiltie band and a large group of local veterans, according to reports. Many other Ashland people plan to take in the day's program.

BULLETIN!

District Attorney Frank Newman intimated late last night that the search for information in the case of the Monmouth football players and local druggist held for beating and robbing E. D. Rice, Texas tourist, would be extended immediately to include questioning of Gene Langley, Monmouth football manager, one Ashland girl, and a Medford girl believed to have been with the party at some time during the evening. Langley and his companion also are alleged to have been at the Messenger home when the money was divided Sunday morning.

"THEY all look alike to me," said District Attorney Frank Newman last night when queried concerning plans for prosecuting Eli (Buck) Cagle, Stanley Borden and Marshall Hearn, Monmouth football players, and Dick Messenger, Ashland drug clerk, who are said to have confessed to the beating and robbing of E. D. Rice, Dallas, Tex., jewelry salesman near Ashland early Sunday morning.

"We are awaiting the boys' decision on whether they will waive grand jury indictments or not before taking further steps," said Newman. "James Chincock, Grants Pass attorney, has been retained by Messenger, and probably will advise the Monmouth trio. He is expected to interview the Monmouth normal school football players in the county jail Friday morning and, if indictments will be required, probably their cases will be under consideration by the inquisitorial body not later than Monday. We plan to carry this case right on through without delay," the district attorney declared. It was expected that the trio from Monmouth would voluntarily appear before Circuit Judge H. D. Norton today, however.

Although much maudlin sentiment has been generated by friends of the local man, Newman reiterated his declaration that all four will look alike in the eyes of the law, and that attempts being made to cast suspicion on their victim will have no bearing on the crime, in which Rice was "taken for a ride" ostensibly to pull his car from a ditch 12 miles south of Ashland but which cul-
