SONS LEAVE FOR CHICO TILT

The SONS football team, riddled by injuries and absences, will leave this noon for Chico where they will meet the Chico State college eleven tomorrow in their last football game of the 1937 season.

Coach Jean Eberhart yesterday said that he had been unable to secure any definite information as to the strength of the Chico squad although he had heard that they have been defeated by College of the Pacific and the University of Nevada, and probably are of about the same caliber as Monmouth and northwest conference teams. Nevertheless, the SONS' mentor expressed confidence that his team, even hampered by injuries, will take the measure of their "sight-unseen" opponent Saturday.

A squad of 22 men will go south for the battle in cars furnished and driven by Ruth Gough, Dr. A. S. Taylor, Bob Ingle, Frank Van Dyke Dyke, Angus Bowmer and Eberhart.

Big Harry Johnson has been fitted with harness to protect his injured shoulder and side and undoubtedly will occupy his regular place at left tackle. Everett Sandberg, left guard, may start the game in the blocking back position regularly held by Nelson or Redke. The former is away from town at present and Redke suffered injuries in the Rook contest which may keep him out tomorrow. If shoulder and knee injuries recover sufficiently, Al Simpson will be in his fullback spot. Otherwise Leonard Warren, a good passer and runner, will take the job on offensive work. Esselstrom and Hudson are ready to start at the halfback posts. Sether and Schilling at ends. Brace and Butler at guards. Plapp at center and, probably, Cary at the tackle berth across the line from Johnson.
